http://www.domaines-delon.com/en/potensac-chateau_potensac_vins.html Potensac is owned by the same people as Leoville Las Cases, run by Jean-Hubert Delon. The estate is situated in the north of the Medoc, between the villages of Blaignan and Ordonnac.

Quality at Potensac has been on an upward curve ever since Michel Delon (of Léoville-Las-Cases) fame took over the running of the property in the 1970s. He sadly passed away in 2000 and Potensac is now run by his dynamic son Jean-Hubert, with the assistance of maître de chai Pierre Rolland, brother of guru oenologist Michel Rolland.

The spring of 2008 was cold (especially April), causing a late start for the growth cycle. The weather conditions in late July and early August allowed a quick and even colour change. The ripening stage then began in a generally cool and wet atmosphere, with rain until the beginning of September. The extremely dry weather through the rest of

September meant it was possible to wait for the optimum ripeness of this late vintage.

Vineyards

The estate's Grand Vin's vineyards are located west of Ordonnac village. Its rows of

The estate's Grand Vin's vineyards are located west of Ordonnac village. Its rows of vines grow on a double thalweg of gravelly clay. They produce a very fi ne wine with tight texture, great richness and wonderful freshness. On the palate, the wine is pure and powerful, the tannins dense and spicy, and the finish of great depth with glorious aromas. Because of these qualities, Château Potensac is often considered to represent the "pure Medoc style". It should be noted that Potensac was the only "Cru Bourgeois Exceptionnel" of its appellation.

The vineyards cover 50 hectares, planted on rich alluvial gravel and red clay soils, with 60% Cabernet Sauvignon, 25% Merlot and 15% Cabernet Franc vines. These vines have an average age of 35 years.

Harvest From 4th to 16th October 2008

Vinification/ The grapes at Potensac are hand-harvested and then vinified in a combination of temperature-controlled, concrete and stainless-steel tanks. The wine is matured in small oak barrels (20% new) for 14-16 months.

Tasting Notes Deep ruby, medium rim; the 2008 Potensac looks robust in the decanter with no sign of

ageing. The first nose was of ripe, fresh blackcurrants, with other mixed, red fruits (from the 40% Cabernet Sauvignon mostly). Not plummy at all despite its 42% Merlot content, Chateau Potensac 2008 gives aromas of flowers, tea leaves and cool mint (from the Cab Franc of 18%). On the palate, it is lightish, with fresh cassis and cherry secondary to chewy tannins and minerality as we taste along. The tannins are fairly smooth by now. Licorice, finishes with a hint of spice and dark chocolate of over 10 second fruit length. Structured, with classic Bordeaux wine tastes.

Serve with A medium-rare sirloin on a hot grill would be the ideal combination.



"Tasted at Chateau Leoville Las-Cases. This has improved from its barrel showing, the nose is very Pauillac in style with touches of tobacco, mint and blackcurrant. The oak is a little disjointed at the moment, but there is fine definition and good persistency. I would afford this Potensac 3-4 years to coalesce because I think it could be a dark horse.
