Sociando Mallet takes its name from two previous owners. A nobleman known as Sociando held the property in 1633. Over a century later, the second part of the estates name came from a captain in the navy who owned the estate by the name of Mallet. It was Mallet who put the two names together to form Sociando Mallet. The modern era of Chateau Sociando Mallet began in 1969, when it was purchased by Jean Gautreau from the Tereygeol family for 250,000 French Francs.

When Jean Gautreau purchased Sociando Mallet in 1969, the property had fallen into poor condition in both the wine making facilities and their Haut Medoc vineyards. In fact, parts of the vineyards had gone fallow, as they had not been tended for years. When Sociando Mallet was originally purchased by Jean Guatreau, less than 8 hectares were under vine. Today, the vineyard is almost 85 hectares of vines at Sociando Mallet. Jean Gautreau quickly began alternating the expanding of the vineyard with additional purchases and replanting selections of his newly purchased vines. He was also simultaneously remodeling and renovating the wine making facilities. He added new, temperature controlled stainless vats and repaired the older concrete vats. Jean Gautreau also constructed a new, modern, tasting room with natural lighting and an unobstructed view of the Gironde.

Château Sociando-Mallet produces full-bodied wines with a deep, dark colour. Their complex bouquet is usually dominated by black fruit aromas with a touch of minerality and well-integrated, elegant oak. Often somewhat "virile" when young, the wines gain in balance and complexity with age. They are fresh, straightforward, and have a wonderful length.

Château Sociando-Mallet has always been a wine with great ageing potential. A wine to be enjoyed even after 30 years in great vintages.

Vineyards

The large, 85-hectare Sociando Mallet vineyard, located in the far north of Haut Medoc appellation. If the old adage is true, that all the best vineyards in Bordeaux have a prime view of the Gironde, Chateau Sociando Mallet, with its unobstructed view of the water from both directions has a privileged terroir. The vineyards are situated north of the Saint Estephe appellation. Being that far north means they have a cooler climate than even their neighbors, just due south in St. Estephe, so they would naturally harvest later in most vintages and perform well in the hot dry years. Although, cooler years would then, also make it difficult for the grapes to develop full ripeness.

The terroir is gravel, with a subsoil of clay, sand and limestone soils. The vineyard of Sociando Mallet is planted to 48% Cabernet Sauvignon, 47% Merlot and 5% Cabernet Franc. This represents a change in plantings. Previously, the vineyard included a higher percentage of Cabernet Sauvignon and less Merlot, as well as a portion of Petit Verdot. As you can see, the Petit Verdot vines have been removed and more Merlot has been planted. The vineyard is planted to a vine density of 8,333 vines per hectare. On average, the vines are close to 30 years of age.

Vinification/ Maturation The wine of Sociando Mallet is vinified in a series of temperature controlled, stainless steel vats and a small portion of traditional cement tanks. Malolactic

Vinification/ Maturation takes place in vat. Chateau Sociando Mallet is aged in a combination of mostly 100% new, French oak barrels and the remainder is aged in tank. On average, 95% of the harvest is aged in mostly new, French oak barrels, while the remaining 5% of the harvest is aged in tank for about 12 months.

**Tasting Notes** 

The 2000 vintage is one of the very good recent vintages, but the wines are late bloomers taking many years to gain the elegance expected of a quality Bordeaux. The very intense nose on this 2000 is showing nicely now with black current, cigar box, licorice and earth, earth, earth. With more time in the decanter, dried fruit and smoke become prominent. There is great aromatic complexity and depth. The palate too is full of flavor. Medium body with a clean, crisp, clear mid-palette, you have only seconds to enjoy it before the tannins grip and overwhelm as you lunge for the water glass.

Serve with

Chateau Sociando Mallet is best served at 15.5 degrees Celsius, 60 degrees Fahrenheit. The cool, almost cellar temperature gives the wine more freshness and lift. Young vintages can be decanted for 2-3 hours. This allows the wine to soften and open its perfume. The wine will also gently warm in the glass, releasing its aromatics. Older vintages might also need decanting, for both aerating and to remove the sediment. The wine of Chateau Sociando Mallet is best served with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast chicken, roasted, braised and grilled dishes. Chateau Sociando Mallet is a perfect match with Asian dishes, hearty fish courses like tuna, mushrooms and pasta as well as cheese.

"The vines are always well regulated, with an overall yield generous but in fact quite reasonable per vineyard, and the additional aromatic complexity given by Cabernet Sauvignon October, often more complex than those of September. The whole is magnificent, of the level of the fifteen or twenty best crus classés, with the ambiguity Pauillac / Saint-Estèphe of the great vintages, Pauillac by body and texture, Saint-Estèphe by the grain of tannin. The intensity of the dress, the softness of the envelope and the freshness of the taste show that we have harvested hair piles. Wait ten or twelve years if we can for the full bloom in the glass. 18.5 / 20 "
