The estate already produced wine in 1608. In 1697, it was sold by Louise Simon Ecoisses Malescot, consul of King Louis XIV at the Parliament of Bordeaux. He gave his name to the property, and his descendants took good care of Malescot and added a large dwelling house and numerous outbuildings, but after the revolution, the property was divided several times between different descendants and sold to different buyers before becoming the property of Count Jean-Baptiste Saint-Exupéry in 1827 who added his name to that of Malescot.

In 1855 Chateau Malescot Saint Exupéry was ranked third grand cru before being sold to a banker from Bordeaux named Fourcade, who renovated the winery and enlarged the vineyard. The chateau passed again through the hands of various owners including Mr. Boissac who built the current castle in 1885 but sold it again in 1901. Many owners succeeded again, and the estate slowly declined until, on 1st June 1955, Paul and Roger Zuger bought it with only seven hectares of vines left. After nearly 30 years of sustained efforts and attention, the blason of Malescot regained its rank and its desire to go ever higher. Today, the son of Roger, Jean-Luc Zuger, is at the head of the estate that was extended to 23.5 hectares, and he continues the work begun by his grandfather and his father.

Winemaker Vintage

Winter was once again marked by alternating cool and mild periods. The arrival of March saw reduced levels of rainfall (17.2 mm) and warm temperatures of around 26°C. These mild conditions awoke nature from its rest IO days earlier than anticipated, with bud break occurring on 25th March. Vines were swiftly met by spring frost that struck the region on 7th April. However, owing to our privileged geography - 600m from the Gironde estuary - our plots were protected entirely from any damage. April proved to be exceptionally dry, having been recorded as the 11th driest year since 1959. Fortunately, the vines did not suffer any impact, thanks to sufficient water reserves amassed over winter in our clay subsoils. Optimal conditions encourage flowering from 31st May, followed by rising temperatures at the start of June, marking the start of summer. After patches of rain at the beginning of July, good weather soon resumed in time for the start of veraison on 21st July, with ideal temperatures in line with seasonal norms.



Vineyards

28 hectares of which 50% Cabernet Sauvignon, 35% Merlot, 10% Cabernet Franc and 5% Petit Verdot. Soil gravel

overlaying chalk or marl which slopes towards the Gironde. Fruit picked into trays to prevent crushing.

Harvest

Hand-picked between 30 September and 5 October, before stopping to wait for more complete maturity,

despite the unfavorable weather forecast, recommencing between October 12th and 20th.

Vinification/ Maturation Temperature controlled and matured in 100% new oak and undergoes malolactic in barrel depending on the vintage. Aged on lees with stirring. 15 months' barrel ageing (70% new barrels) before being racked without

fining or filtration.

Tasting Notes

Medium-deep crimson. Cassis and carob hints with vegemite aromas. Chocolaty palate with blackcurrant, malty

flavours, and fine grained/ gritty textures. Very good mid-palate richness and mineral length.

"The 2021 Malescot St. Exupery has turned out nicely in its fleshy, flamboyant style, bursting with aromas of dark berries, cherries, and creamy new oak. Medium to full-bodied, velvety, and seamless, with supple tannins and a lively core of fruit, it's a strong effort.

This rather small, family-owned estate amounts to just over 28 hectares of vines. At the time of the 1855 classification, Malescot St. Exupery was much larger, but over the years, various proprietors sold off parcels, leaving the estate's holdings mostly concentrated on the plateau. Maturation is relatively unusual, in that the wines aren't racked and see bâtonnage of the lees, and they're bottled without either fining or filtration. Since around 2000, when Jean Luc Zuger's investments and changes started to make an impact, Malescot's style became rather rich and fleshy, standing out as one of the more dramatic, demonstrative wines in the appellation. In 2021, the Malescot team picked between 30 September and 5 October before stopping to wait for more complete maturity, despite the unfavorable weather forecast, recommencing between October 12th and 20th."

"The 2021 Malescot St. Exupery is a terrific effort, offering up aromas of sweet cassis and plums mingled with notions of licorice, espresso roast and toasty oak. "49% Cabernet Sauvignon, 38% Merlot, 8% Cabernet Franc, 5% Petit Verdot. Cask sample. Mid to dark crimson. Sweet, seductive nose. Very gentle tannins which lurk rather than dominate. A wine that really does taste like a young wine – and a young Margaux at that – that will blossom. Dry but not too drying finish. Neat. Very classic claret with sufficient but not excessive ripeness. Though there is nothing remotely flashy about it and I may be being too generous with my score; its charms are quite subtle. And it's not especially concentrated. A 'fluid' wine... Some may criticize it for its lack of weight. Drink 2027 – 2042."
