## Sustainability

Château Prieuré-Lichine, certified high environmental value in 2019, is engaged in a sustainable certification procedure.

## General Info

Originally a priory of Benedictine monks who cultivated grapes for service at dinner and at religious ceremonies, practices gradually evolved by the 18th century to establish sales of the wine under the name Le Prieuré de Cantenac. As a consequence of the French Revolution, the property was seized, divided and sold in 1789 to several surrounding estates, including Château Palmer. A portion was bought by Monsieur Pagès who passed on the estate to his widow, when due to its reputation and broker prices received a fourth growth classification in 1855. Several changes in ownership resulted in changes to the name, such as Le Prieuré and Prieuré-Cantenac, and when the late wine writer and authority Alexis Lichine arrived to buy the estate it consisted of 11 hectares of neglected vines.

Alexis Lichine bought the vineyard in 1951 (shortly after having purchased the Margaux estate Château Lascombes with a consortium) and work began to group and reconstitute the property on the ideal slightly-rising ground. With the money, he was garnering from the import business and a few partners, Alexis Lichine bought the Prieuré for 11,000 pounds, at the time about \$16,000. In 1953, with the help of Count Lur-Saluces of Château d'Yquem, Lichine renamed the Prieuré to Château Prieuré-Lichine.

With the estate renamed in 1953, the following year Cantenac wineries were entitled to use the appellation of Margaux Sacrificing quantity for quality, trades in portions of desirable land at a loss of two to one were made with third growth neighbours Palmer, Ferrière, Kirwan, Giscours, Issan, Boyd-Cantenac and second growth neighbours Durfort-Vivens and Brane-Cantenac, adding up to 47 acres (19 ha) of vineyards by the mid-1960s. With an aim to produce a wine well beyond its classification, extensive replanting and repairs and investments were made to the equipment, and by the 1970s the estate amounted to 58 hectares dispersed across the communes Cantenac and Margaux.

After Lichine's death in 1989, the estate was run by his son Sacha for several years, with oenologist Michel Rolland acting as consultant, until the estate was sold to the Groupe Ballande in 1999. The winery currently employs Stéphane Derenoncourt as its consulting oenologist.

## Vintage

In 2019, the great terroirs of the plots making up the Château Prieuré-Lichine vineyard once again combined harmoniously to produce aromatic, fleshy and velvety wines, of hallmark Margaux style.

Free of major climatic setbacks and with a very welcome episode of weather at the end of the season, the vintage was both generous and of high quality. A rollercoaster season in a vintage that was full of surprises. Following a quite mild and dry winter, the 2019 vine cycle at Château Prieuré-Lichine began with a bud-break in normal conditions at the end of March. The potential crop size was large with good, even vine shooting. The few episodes of frost experienced in the Médoc had no effect on the potential volume of the crop.

Particularly rainy spring weather in April and June ensured sufficient water reserves for the vines. Vine disease pressure was at a reasonable level. The flowering process benefited from the good weather conditions.

Summer weather suddenly set in at the end of June with a heat-wave, followed by a second and more intense one, around 25th July. Just as the net shortfall in the season's rainfall was starting to challenge the end of the ripening process, a welcome downpour arrived on 22<sup>nd</sup> September, the trigger for the harvesting to start in the young Merlot vines, whose grapes had now re-swelled thanks to this welcome rain.



<b>Vintage</b>	Because the plots of the Prieuré-Lichine vineyard are spread across the whole of the Margaux appellation, the ripening and harvesting dates were staggered accordingly over more than three weeks. The health of the grapes was very satisfactory. The last Cabernet Sauvignon, harvested on 15th October, showed fabulous balances. The vinifications went very smoothly with long macerations for the vats destined for the First Wine. The Merlot was ripe and displayed great roundness on the palate. The Cabernet Sauvignon, which benefited from the mid-September rains by reaching full ripeness levels, offered juicy grapes with noble pedigree that would contribute to perfection their energy and their dense, silky texture in the blend. Underpinned by the brilliant freshness of the Cabernet Sauvignon, the 2019 vintage affirms a potential for ageing and a capacity to develop over time all the complexity of a Great Growth.
<b>Vineyards</b>	The Prieuré-Lichine vineyards are naturally, in view of Lichine's many acquisitions, very widely spread across the Margaux commune. Most lie to the north of Cantenac, on one of the gravel ridges that characterise the Médoc. The vines are 54% Cabernet Sauvignon, 40% Merlot, 5% Petit Verdot and 1% Cabernet Franc, and are planted at a density of 8500 vines/ha.
<b>Harvest</b>	Merlot: 23rd Sept. – 4th Oct. Cabernet Sauvignon: 7th – 15th Oct
<b>Maturation</b>	After manual harvesting followed by a meticulous sorting (on a sorting table and then optically), the fruits are fermented in vats without crushing for about 30 days before being aged in oak barrels (40% new and 60% one wine).
<b>Tasting Notes</b>	Prieuré Lichine is only really good in big, warm years. Brilliant the last time in 2016. With 2019, the high level of maturity that we already had in 2016 and 2018 is accompanied by an amazing kick of Frio minerality, which gives the wine wings! The nose is very fine, little sweet, very polished. Predominantly black fruit, very delicate. The mouth amazingly fresh and delicious and fine. Superb, polished tannins. Here we have a wonderful potpourri of black fruits, highlighted with sour cherries, a nice freshness, everything is very fine, stylish, with a great straight line. Finely woven, very chic, aromatic Margaux with totally polished tannins. That's really stylish! A fine and chic Margaux.
<b>Serve with</b>	Prieuré Lichine is best served with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast chicken, roasted, braised, and grilled dishes. Chateau Prieuré Lichine is a perfect match with Asian dishes, hearty fish courses like tuna, mushrooms, and pasta as well as cheese.
