Sustainability

They take a traditional approach in the vineyard, avoiding chemical herbicides and using sustainable pest and disease control. As testament to their commitment, they are involved with the local university in several research projects with a goal of improving quality while reducing impact on the environment.

The crop is harvested by hand to ensure gentle handling and the grapes are hand sorted three times before entering the winery.

General Info

For the past four centuries, Château Haut Bailly has overlooked 28 hectares of vines in a single block. These grow on soil consisting of sand and gravel from the Tertiary period with a fossil stone subsoil. Haut Bailly's reputation as one of the very finest wines of Bordeaux was established in the 19th century. Haut-Bailly was bought by the Sanders family in 1955 and was run by Jean Sanders until 1998 when Robert G. Wilmers, an American banker, purchased it. Robert G. Wilmers continues to emphasize quality in all aspects of production, combining a blend of tradition and modernity with respect for the environment. Château Haut-Bailly's unique terroir produces wines that are outstandingly reliable, and whose prestige is due to an inimitable style marked by finesse and elegance.

Bob Wilmers passed away in December 2017 at age 83. The estate is now managed by Chris Wilmers, the son of Bob Wilmers.

Today, the estate is directed by Veronique Sanders, the fourth generation of her

family associated with Haut-Bailly.

Although a mild, wet winter favoured early budburst, the vineyard was affected by the frosts that occurred in early April. Flowering benefited from hot, dry conditions

during a spring with heavy rainfall, which caused coulure and millerandage, particularly on the Merlot, as well as strong mildew pressure. The weather

conditions were particularly mild from mid-August until the harvest.

Vineyards

The Haut-Bailly estate accounts for 33 hectares of the Médoc, of which 30 hectares are vineyards, largely in a single block on a gravel croupe. The soils are a mixture of sand and Tertiary gravel over Faluns de Léognan, a subsoil rich in sandstone and ancient fossilised shells. The vines themselves are mainly Cabernet Sauvignon (64%), which are planted on the upper parts of the croupe and slopes where the drainage is best, with 30% Merlot, which are planted on those plots where the soils are richer in clay. The remaining 6% is Cabernet

Franc, and overall, the planting density is an admirable 10000 vines/ha.

Harvest

Harvesting from September 27th to October 11th. Yields reduced by 60% this year.

Winemaking

This 2021 vintage is the first to be vinified in its entirety in the property's new cellar. Initiated in 2017 by Robert Wilmers shortly before his death, the construction of this majestic, state-of-the-art winery was launched in 2018 by his son, Chris Wilmers, Chairman of the Estate's Supervisory Board. Designed by architect Daniel Romeo, the elegant infrastructure perfectly blends into its surrounding environment. The vinification took place at 24°C in order to preserve the perfect freshness and elegance despite the high degrees in alcohol. In small oak barriques (55% new) for 16 months and is bottled unfined and unfiltered.

Tasting Notes

Strong ruby colour. The nose is deep and cool, a fantastic scent, floral notes, cassis, blackberries, subtle wood from barrel aging. The palate is spicy, fresh, clear and pure like a mountain stream, the wine has a very good structure, shows a lot of Cabernet character, that is once again pure precision, the tannins are striking, super finely woven, the acidity is perfectly dosed. The finish has a very nice length, ends with red fruit and delicate spice. Whatever they do on Haut-Bailly is once again excellent.

"Impresses from the first moment with its enveloping nose, and purity of flavour. Plenty of estate signature, with finely grained tannins and creamy black fruit that is concentrated with density through the mid palate but not opulent, delivering cocoa bean, slate, cassis and gunsmoke personality and poise. "Dark garnet in color, the wine is equally dark aromatically with its nuances of smoky black cherries, blackberries, cocoa, cigar box, flowers, and black plums. On the palate, the wine is focused on its chewy, black cherries, chalk, spicy black raspberries, cocoa, and spice. Texturally, the wine offers an exotic, sensuous, elegant quality that I really like. It separates Haut Bailly from all the other wines I tasted. The wine is probably always going to be a bit reticent in character, so, allow it a few years in the cellar, and sometime in the decanter as well. The wine blends 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, 22% Merlot, 10% Petit Verdot, and 3% Cabernet Franc, representing the highest percentage of Petit Verdot in the history of the estate. 2021 is the first vintage produced in their new, state-of-the-art cellars. Drink from 2026-2055."

"Initially you notice the blackberries, black plums, and black currants before moving on to the tobacco, flowers, spice, and smoke in the aromatic profile. Supple, refined, and elegant, perhaps the best way to describe the wine is modern chic, or modern classic if you prefer. The tannins are soft and polished, and the fruit is pure, clean, and fresh, with a salty, mildly-chalky, supple endnote. Although it is going to probably always be a bit reticent in character, you will be able to approach and enjoy this wine in its youth, as well as age it for more complexity. The wine blends 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, 22% Merlot, 10% Petit Verdot and 3% Cabernet Franc. The blend represents the highest percentage of Petit Verdot in the history of the estate. 13% ABV, pH 3.9. The harvest took place September 27 to October 11. The Grand Vin was produced from 50% of the harvest. 2021 is the first vintage produced in their new, state-of-the-art cellars. "The 2021 Haut-Bailly harked back to the older style when I tasted it out of barrel during en primeur. Now bottled since the end of March, it has developed a very composed and harmonious bouquet with blackberry, briar, cedar, and melted tar scents that gradually gain intensity in the glass. The palate is medium-bodied with fine tannins, again quite saline with hints of black olive and Japanese nori tincturing the black fruit. It

segues into a classically styled finish, with a welcome touch of black pepper on the aftertaste. Give this three of four years in bottle, and it should drink well for 20+ years."

"The 2021 Haut-Bailly is built around 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, the blend employing less Merlot and more Petit Verdot this year since the latter was not affected by frost. It was picked between September 27 and October 11 and matured in 50% new oak with 10% vin de presse. Allowed to open in the glass, it unfurls to reveal blackberry, briar, touches of crushed stone and cedar. The taut, fresh palate is medium-bodied with sappy black fruit and fine acidity. This is back to the older style of Haut-Bailly in some ways; less opulent, in keeping with the style of the vintage, and delivering good weight on the finish, even if there is not the persistent aftertaste of previous vintages. The great virtue of this Haut-Bailly is the sapidity that marks the conclusion. The kind of Pessac-Léognan that needs to be decanted then poured at the dinner table."

"The 2021 Haut-Bailly is incredibly poised, even if it is clearly a wine of reserve in this vintage. Its vertical build speaks of pure sophistication. A nice complexity with finesse.
