Sustainability The vines are cultivated using traditional growing methods and an environmentally-

friendly approach with ploughing, organic fertilizers, minimum use of pesticides

(including mating disruption), and manual harvests.

General Info The Pomerol vineyard developed from the 12th century up to the French Revolution

of 1789 around the Commanderie of the Knights of St John of Jerusalem, Rhodes, and Malta. The present day, Château Gazin, which was once a village in the 18th century, is located on the site of the hospital built by the Knights to host the pilgrims on their

way to Santiago de Compostella.

The logo for Chateau Gazin was inspired by an ancient connection to Knights of the Templars. Not only is the logo for Chateau Gazin old, so is the property. It dates all the way back to 1772 when the Pomerol vineyards were purchased by Antoine Feuilhade. Over the years, Chateau Gazin was sold and resold to numerous owners before it was bought by the current owners, the Bailliencourt family.

The estate's Bordeaux wine vineyards are large for the Pomerol appellation. They are 64.2 acres. The vineyards are in one single parcel, which is also unusual for Pomerol. The terroir is clay with gravel. Gazin is situated on the Pomerol plateau. Chateau Gazin has good neighbors. They share borders with Petrus and L'Evangile! In fact, in 1969, Chateau Gazin sold 12.5 acres to Petrus. While the sale helped the cash starved property, the loss of those vines reduced the quality of Chateau Gazin. Further exacerbating the loss of quality was when the estate switched to machine harvesting in 1979, coupled with an increase in yields. Both practices have been

discontinued today.

Vintage With its 2021 vintage, Château Gazin has had a difficult year. A serious attack of

mildew caused a reduction of almost 60% in our grand vin taking into account the production of Hospitalet de Gazin, the domain's second wine, which contributed to limiting the share of the grand vin even more. Heavy rain in May and June, combined with lower temperatures in spring and summer, in contrast to recent years, made this vintage a more "traditional", less sunny Pomerol, providing a 100% merlot wine with

an alcohol content of 13.4°.

Vineyards The terroir at Château Gazin consists of Gunzian gravel on the surface and a subsoil of blue and green clay with

iron oxides (iron residues). As is characteristic of great terroirs, these clays (smectites) ensure that the vines have a reasonably stable supply of water. Château GAZIN's terroir essentially consists of the clay-gravel subsoil of the Pomerol plateau. The vineyard is planted with 90% Merlot, 7% Cabernet Sauvignon and 3% Cabernet Franc. The average age of the vines is 35 years. The vines are planted with a density of 5,500 to 7,000 per

hectare. HVE Level 3 certification.

Harvest The merlot harvest took place from 21 to 30 September. Yield 18 hl/ha.

Vinification/ The 2021 was matured in barrels for 14 months: 50% in new barrels and 50% in one-year barrels with light

Maturation fining with egg whites.

Tasting Notes This year Gazin used 100% Merlot. Powerful with broad texture on the palate and harmonious, ripe fruit

character. This has a linear, mineral element and very dense, ripe tannins. There's creaminess and spicy aromas

from oak but it's integrating well. Some herbal character on the finish is refreshing and appetising.

Winemaker's Our 2021 vintage, pure merlot, presents red fruit (morello cherry) notes and also floral, airier notes that evoke

violets and irises. The wine, build on balance and elegance, is rounded but not overpowering. It opens with a

smooth attack and continues with a beautiful mid-palate, all carried by a freshness and energy that provide

good length.

"I was optimistic for the 2021 Gazin in barrel, but that optimism hasn't been realized in bottle. Offering up aromas of minty blackberries and herbs, it's medium-bodied, firm and astringent, with a bitter, mouth-puckering, discreetly metallic finish. Time may be kind to it, but only gamblers would test that hypothesis." - WK, Wine Advocate

"The 2021 Gazin is a fine effort, unfurling in the glass with aromas of sweet red berries, cherries, plums, incense, and raw cocoa. Medium to full-bodied, layered, and concentrated, it's rather rich and elegantly muscular in the context of the vintage, with a deep core of fruit, powdery tannins and bright acids. Mildew pressure combined with wet conditions that made it impossible to enter the vineyard with tractors, delivering low yields of only 18 hectoliters per hectare, and the grand vin is entirely Merlot this year.

Directed by Christophe de Baillencourt and overseen by Mickael Obert, this 24-hectare family-owned estate is producing its best wines in the modern era. The vineyards themselves straddle two essential soil types: gravels opposite the château and deep clays on the plateau (where the estate is a neighbor of Pétrus, to which it ceded a prime bloc in the 1960s). Herbicides have never been used here, and cover crops are the order of the day since 2018. Planted with 85% Merlot, replanting is gradually introducing a touch more Cabernet Franc and Cabernet Sauvignon (the latter first included in the blend with the outstanding 2019 vintage). New oak is much better integrated than was the case a decade ago, and Gazin has gained in depth and energy. The 2021 is a fine effort in a challenging year, and it's one of the vintage's more serious, structured wines."

"Black berries and black plums on the nose with some tobacco leaf, graphite, and bitter chocolate. It's focused on the palate, with firm tannins that melt and relax into the black fruit. Medium-bodied and well-structured. Mineral at the end. Try from 2025."

"Dark chocolate, perfume, and black fruits on the nose - fragrant rose and iris petals. Succulent yet quite densely mouth filling straight away, the chalky salinity and bitter chocolate edged tannins in full force gripping the tongue and cheeks with a blueberry, raspberry, and black cherry fruit pulp. It certainly has the density that others in the vintage don't have but it's missing the elongation and some of the refinement that others show. You do get fully ripe fruit here though, the acidity underneath and a plushness that should see this through ageing nicely."

"Chocolate covered cherries, and flowers create the aromatic profile here. Made using 100% Merlot, the wine is fresh, soft, supple, vibrant, and fresh. There is a mildly, divergent green olive notes at the end that distracts just a bit from the otherwise, classic cherry and cocoa characteristics. Yields were quite low this year at only 18 hectoliters per hectare, which is less than half the normal production. Drink from 2025-2042."

"Produced from 100% Merlot, the wine opens with notes of flowers, mocha, black cherry, and wet earth. Round, fleshy and fresh, there is lift and brightness to all the sweet, dark cherries and plums in the earthy, sweet, lifted finish. "This year Gazin is 100% Merlot produced from an extremely low yield of 18 hl/ha. Bright purple colour. The nose is very pure with fresh plums and the slightest hint of spice. The palate shows its 100% Merlot with silky, rounded fruit and moderate but refreshing acidity. Compact but soft, this supple Pomerol has a fresh finish that should make it very enjoyable in the mid-term."

"The 2021 Gazin has a harmonious, defined bouquet of red and black fruit laced with black truffle and well-integrated oak. The palate is medium-bodied with slightly tough tannins on the entry. A much more linear Gazin compared to recent vintages, leading to a sapid finish. It pulls up a bit short now, but it should fill out during élevage."

The perfume is superb, and while the oak is certainly expressive, and it is perfectly matched with the density of the fruit, this makes it not only an outlier in this vintage, but this point of difference will turn heads, and I admire the confidence and conviction in this wine."

"The nose is elegant, racy and reveals a certain delicacy, a fine richness, silkiness, a good definition as well as a nice little multi-layer side. We find notes of blueberry, pulpy blackberry, blueberry and more slightly cherry combined with delicate touches of crushed currants, fine points of cherry blossom, nutmeg, star anise as well as discrete points of toasted almond, Bourbon vanilla and a subtle touch of cinnamon. The palate is fruity, balanced and reveals juiciness, minerality, good definition, harmony, delicacy, straightness, and finesse. On the palate this wine expresses notes of pulpy blackberry, blueberry and more slightly crushed blackcurrant combined with touches of bright raspberry, hints of cardamom, toast, tonka bean as well as a subtle hint of sense of place/root/terroir and a very discreet hint of fresh vanilla. The tannins are supple, sapid, precise, and racy. Good length."
