But that is not what the property was originally known for. In fact, before Bordeaux wine was produced at the estate, it earned fame for being a hunting area.That all changed when Alexandre de Segur, who also owned numerous, other illustrious Bordeaux properties such as Chateau Mouton, Chateau Lafite and Chateau Latour , gave the property to his son, Nicolas Alexandre. Alexandre did not keep the property long. In 1778, he sold it to Etienne Theodore Dumoulin. During the early 1800's what we know of today as Montrose was actually part of the large Calon Segur estate. It was Etienne Dumoulin who created Chateau Montrose, due to its unique, gravel terroir. What Etienne Dumoulin noticed in those days is thought of as one of the best terroirs in all of Bordeaux. At that point in time, the true birth Chateau Montrose takes place. Vintage	 2019 marked an important step in the progression of our environmental approach, which now correntire vineyard. This year, the good climatic conditions combined with our "green" farming methor us to obtain a beautiful harvest combining quality and quantity. A great vintage ending in "9" and hottest of the past decade. The exceptionally mild and dry winter was marked by temperatures above average for the season. 14 April, our vineyard, which benefits from the moderating influence of the estuary, was spared from the rains in the two first weeks of June led us to fear the development of disease, but the vines revery good health, and we maintained our environmental course. Full flowering, uniform and quick, took place during the first week of June. The first signs of colour change appeared from 30 July. A uniform veraison followed, slowed down by cool and rainy weather in August.

	very pronounced red fruit aromas and flavours reflect another expression of the terroir in a distinctive style			
	which is less elaborately complex than that of the first wine.			
Harvest	2019 was a very important vintage at Chateau Montrose, marked by the environmental approach undertaken			
	by the team, the implementation of "green" cultivation practices out in the vineyards. This approach, coupled			
	with the climatic conditions of the year, led to a very successful harvest, which began on September 19 and			
	ended on October 8. The harvest was carried out on a plot-by-plot basis, with grapes from the different lots vinified separately.
