General Info Château Tronquoy (formerly Tronquoy-Lalande) is a wine estate in the Saint-Estèphe

appellation of northern Bordeaux's Médoc region, on the left bank of the Gironde estuary, roughly 60km (37 miles) north of Bordeaux city center. Its grand vin is made

chiefly from Merlot and Cabernet Sauvignon.

Vintage The château reports on the 2019 growing season as follows: "A sweet, dry winter on

the whole, a contrasting spring followed by a very hot summer with some heatwaves in July and a fine harvest, sum up the weather conditions for 2019. The end of the exceptionally warm winter led to early budburst at the end of March. Uneven spring weather, with particularly cool April and May, causes the vines to lose their lead. Tronquoy's early-ripening terroirs favored rapid, uniform flowering in just a few days. The first signs of veraison appeared on July 30. The hot summer was marked by a scorching July, making 2019 one of the hottest years of the decade. Once again, our clay gravel soils proved their ability to cope with drought. Finally, the saving rains at the end of August and mid-September kick-started the ripening process and helped the grapes to concentrate beautifully. The harvest took place in good weather conditions. In the cellar, the grapes showed their full potential, heralding a great vintage. The juices quickly released their dense colours, adding great concentration. The acidity/sugar ratio is very good, and fermentation is proceeding normally. Gentle extractions are preserving the quality and elegance of the tannins. 2019 is taking shape in a precise style, in the fine tradition of the great "9" vintages."

Vineyards With a total of 18 planted hectares of vines, the vineyard is planted to a density of 9,000 vines per hectare. The vines are on average close to 25 years of age. The terroir is mostly gravel with some clay in the soil. The vineyard is located inland from Chateau Montrose. The 30-hectare Saint Estèphe vineyard of Chateau Tronquoy Lalande is planted with 52% Merlot, 39% Cabernet Sauvignon, 6% Petit Verdot and 3% Petit Verdot. This represents a large shift in the vineyard since the new owners

took control. Now, you find much more Merlot and less Cabernet Sauvignon.

Harvest Dates unknown. The harvest took place in good weather conditions.

To produce the wine of Chateau Tronquoy Lalande, vinification takes place in 22 geothermal powered, stainless-steel tanks. The tanks allow for a parcel-by-parcel vinification. The tanks were made with a slight pitch

or tilt at the bottom of the vat. The purpose is to allow the winemaker to capture more of the press wine. The additional press wine that is recovered utilizing this method is of better quality. The reason behind it is that it does not require mechanical actions to be produced. Gentle actions do produce softer, more elegant wine, which of course lends more softness to Tronquoy Lalande. All of these changes have clearly improved the quality here, giving the wine more finesse, softer, more gentle textures, and much better purity of fruit. On

average, the wine is aged in 25% new, French oak barrels for an average of 12 months before bottling.

Despite the blend being 50% Merlot, 44% Cabernet Sauvignon and 6% Petit Verdot, it is the Cabernet aromas that predominate here with lush notes of plums, spice, cedar wood and liquorice. The wine is silky and a little closed at first. With time it opens up to reveal bramble and cassis fruit and a vein of savoury acidity. There is a

firm reverberation of fresh tannin on the long finish which promises well for its aging potential.

Serve with Tronquoy Lalande is best served with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast

chicken, roasted, braised, stewed, and grilled dishes. With its spicy character, Tronquoy Lalande also pairs well

with a wide variety of Asian dishes.

"As I wrote earlier this year, the 2019 Tronquoy-Lalande has turned out beautifully, and it continues to show very well, offering up inviting aromas of wild berries, spices, rose petals and cassis. Medium to full-bodied, layered, and sensual, with lively acids, ripe tannins, and a long, vibrant finish, it's reminiscent of a somewhat more sunkissed and extroverted sibling of the terrific 2016 at this address.

As I wrote earlier this year, Tronquoy-Lalande is an estate that deserves to be much better known. This was the second vineyard planted in Saint-Estèphe, after the Clos of Calon-Ségur, but its Royalist owner didn't participate in the 1855 classification due to his disapproval of Napoléon III. The vineyard itself consists of a single 30-hectare block on an eight-meter-deep gravel ridge directly behind châteaux Meyney and Montrose. Certified organic with the 2021 vintage, Tronquoy-Lalande has never seen herbicides; and after its acquisition by Olivier and Martin Bouygues in 2006, the winery was redesigned with input from the late Jean-Philippe Delmas, equipped with two-tiered stainless-steel tanks after the model used at Château Haut-Brion. Ably overseen by Yves Delsol, who has worked at the estate for 30 years and thus knows its every detail, the style is seamless, complex, and concentrated, with structural elegance that reflects the quality of these gravel soils more than it does any stereotypes of Saint-Estèphe rusticity. Indeed, in any revision of the 1855 classification, this estate will clearly win classified growth status. Tronquoy-Lalande isn't sold en primeur, and readers can find all the vintages reviewed here on the marketplace.
