Vintage	The mild and rainy winter awakens the vines in a homogeneous way with an early ripening. A few plots of merlot in the lowest part of the hilltops of the estate are impacted by the frost during the month of April. The spring was not sunny but rainy until the end of May. This imposes a slow pace of growth. At the beginning of June, the return of sunlight and the sudden spike in temperatures ensures the smooth flow of the flowering on almost the entire estate. Some merlots, the most sensitive ones, are affected by "coulure". Mid-June, from the fruit set, a capricious weather forecast punctuated by a number of rainy episodes will be installed until the end of the "veraison" at the beginning of August. It will be necessary to wait for the summer to be finally here with 4 weeks of magical weather which could permit us to catch up with the delay of the ripeness. The right ripeness of the plots only arrives the last week of September. At the beginning of October, the cabernet sauvignon expresses at last their full potential, the freshness and tension remind us of historical great vintages.	
Vineyards	The vineyard nestles in the heart of the St Julien terroir among the most beautiful slopes of Garonne gravel, facing the Gironde River. The clayey gravel subsoil allows excellent growing conditions whatever weather the vintage brings. The plowing is traditional, without weeding or herbicide. The grape varieties are Cabernet Sauvignon (74%), Merlot (23%) and Cabernet Franc (3%).	
Harvest Winemaking	Manual harvest. From 27 of September to 7 October After the de-stemming, the berries are carefully sorted, crushed, and poured in wooden vats thermo- regulated, according to their plots. The alcoholic fermentation lasts from 7 to 10 days and the extraction is always respectful of the juice by adjusting the number of pumping depending on the cuvées and the vintages. The maceration is about 3 weeks then the juice is drawn in barrels, lot by lot. The wine is then aged between 16 and 18 months in French oak barrels of which 60% are brand new, in a cellar maintained at 15°. The wines are topped up 3 times a week to avoid any contact between the wine and the air, the racking is traditional using the so-called "à l'esquive" method.	



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Tasting Notes The mellowness of Léoville Barton is the greatest highlight of its 2021 vintage. Thanks to its 13.12% alcohol level and the ripe polyphenols, the entire palate is flooded with some freshy tastes. Though this year's aromas are not as complex and varied as those in the previous three vintages, Barton's signature silky structure is still prominent. If you're into the pure aesthetic style, the creamy texture of Léoville Barton 2021 will definitely charm you. Serve with Leoville Barton is best served at 15.5 degrees Celsius, 60 degrees Fahrenheit. The cool, almost cellar temperature gives the wine more freshness and lift. Chateau Leoville Barton is best served with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast chicken, roasted, braised, and grilled dishes. Production 11.500 cases made. The palate has a smooth and cohesive entry, very well-knit with beautifully integrated oak. Crisp acidity with the perfect amount of tension on the classically-styled finish, this Léoville Barton demonstrates the advantages of their brand new cellar (even though the reception was not finished in time!) "Opaque ruby core, purple reflections, subtle brightening on the rim. Inviting dark forest berries and ripe plums on the nose with fine nougat and candied orange zest. Taut, juicy, dark wild berries, already developing with integrated tannins and a long mineral finish. Has very good ageing potential." - PM, Falstaff Magazine

"The nose is fruity, elegant and reveals just the right amount of concentration/power, delicacy in its power, attention to detail and depth. There are notes of bright wild blackcurrant, boysenberry and more lightly pulpy/crunchy cherry combined with hints of graphite, salinity and a subtle hint of toast, discrete hints of blueberry, star anise, sweet spices. The palate is juicy, precise, elegant and offers pulpiness, aromatic purity, gourmandize, a fine blackness, density, precision, accuracy, and a beautiful mineral backbone. On the palate, this wine expresses notes of pulpy/juicy blackberry, pulpy raspberry and more slightly morello cherry combined with fine touches of blueberry, star anise, discreet hints of almost roasted red berries, a subtle hint of lily, liquorice, racy gravel, a subtle hint of iodine and pepper. Good length. The tannins are elegant, supple, sapid and offers an aromatic quality. The wine is in the full wooden phase but, despite this, the wood does not dominate but coats the fruit."
