Family estate, owned by the Rulliers since 1860. The Chateau de la Huste's vines are
on one of the highest parts of Saillans. In old french, La Huste means the bump.
Château Dalem is one of the leading estates in Fronsac, an old appellation near the
city of Libourne that is often overlooked by connoisseurs. The vineyard was planted in
1610 and stayed in the same family for over three centuries. The handsome, compact
château is about a century younger, but still predates most of the châteaux of the
Médoc and nearby Saint-Emilion. It is located in the township of Saillans, just on the
outskirts of the city of Libourne, and was purchased in 1955 by Michel Rullier. In 2002
his daughter, Brigitte Rullier-Loussert, took over the estate and began to make a
series of improvements that have now catapulted Dalem to the forefront of Fronsac
estates.

Nearby, the Rullier's manage a separate property known as Château de la Huste, which is a typical Fronsac in a slightly lighter style than Dalem. Chateau de la Huste is an eight-hectare property owned by the Rullier family (Château Dalem) overlooking the town of Libourne across the River Isle Valley.

In 2019, early budding was followed by a sporadically wet and cool April, May, and June. This meant uneven flowering in early June, but from mid-June onwards the weather turned dry and hot, leading to successful fruit set.

July was mainly dry but with some storms. This meant the gravel terraces of the Médoc and limestone soils in general had no problems getting the right kind of hydric stress, but more water-logged soils found it tougher.

August and September were hot and dry, so ripening and harvest were successful, except for certain cases of extreme water stress on the driest soils, which saw some bunches shrivel in early September.

June right through to October saw higher temperatures than average. Rain from 20 September onwards allowed the Merlots to ripen, often with high alcohol, and Cabernet did particularly well because the rains meant their ripening could go on for longer, lowering alcohols and allowing for more 'normal' development after the hot weather.

Vineyards

40 hl/ha. Average vine age 40 years. Planting density 5,500 to 6,600 vine stocks depending on the plots. 90% Merlot, 10% Cabernet Franc. Clay and limestone hills and sloping plateau.

Harvest

Grapes picked by hand when they are fully ripe and put in baskets. Sorted minutely before and after full destemming

Vinification/ Maturation The work of the vineyard and winemaking processes are identical to those of Château Dalem with the exception of wine aging, which is half in tanks and half in French oak barrels. Fermentation in concrete tanks with built-in thermoregulation which guarantees better control of the fermentation process. Long vatting period (3 weeks) for a slow and gentle extraction of the phenolic agents. Malolactic fermentation in barrels. 12 to 15 months in new barrels (having matured 1 or 2 batches of wine). 20% of the barrels are replaced every year and toasting levels are selected for optimum enhancement of our wine's fruit flavors.

Tasting Notes

On the clay-limestone slopes of the commune of Saillans, De La Huste "La Bosse" is produced from 8 Ha of vines with an average age of 40 years. In this beautifully crafted vintage, this wine gives all the measure of Fronsac. The brilliant garnet color announces aromas of ripe black fruit, aniseed plum jam and blackberries. Lively attack on well-integrated tannins forming a remarkable balance, revealing the flavors of black fruits, chocolate, and tobacco on a long finish. Style and concentration in an exceptional vintage that will give its full potential to those who show a little patience.
