With its 20 hectares (50 acres) in one single plot, Château La Vieille Cure appears on a famous map of the Guyenne region, known as the Belleyme map, dated 1780. Parish records show grapes were grown there in the 17th Century. The vines occupy a privileged location on plateaus and slopes that are oriented to the southeast. The estate runs along the River Isle at an elevation of 65 metres, where it soaks up the sun, while enjoying perfect drainage. This situation favors the growth of grapes that ripen generously and under ideal physical conditions.

The property has been greatly renovated since 1986 when it was bought by American friends: Bordeaux lovers who recognized the exceptional potential of the estate. Parts of the vineyard were extended and replanted, without of course touching the very old vines, some of which go back over 75 years. A new winery was built, housing the latest equipment, and aging in oak casks was begun. The overall objective of these investments was to make high quality wines worthy of worldwide distribution. The new owners launched a new marketing program for the wines, based on bottling exclusively at the chateau. Château La Vieille Cure had been little known outside Fronsac but is now exported to more than 25 countries. The main markets remain France, the United States, China and Britain.

Improvements are still continuing. The owners are driven by perfectionism and intend to continue their efforts to make the wine amongst the highest ranking in the Libourne area of the Right Bank of the Dordogne.

Vintage

Around six months of heavy rainfall followed by four months of drought and heat caused the winemakers of Bordeaux to break out in a cold sweat during the growth period for the 2016 vintage. The fear that they were facing a total disaster was at the back of their minds all the time. The stresses and strains experienced not only by the vines, but also the people who worked with them, were huge – and it turned out to be crucial that the right decisions were taken concerning

the work in the vineyards. A feeling of relief only broke out shortly before the harvest, turning into one of jubilation after the musts had fermented. Now it was clear after all the stress that the wine in their cellars was of exceptional quality. There had probably never been such a strange vintage in Bordeaux ever before! The only appellation which surpasses almost all previous vintages in 2016 is Fronsac.

Vineyards

A plateau of limestone; bordering slopes with chalk and clay soils. 20 hectares comprising Merlot 74%; Cabernet Franc 22%; Cabernet Sauvignon 4%

Fermentation in stainless steel vats for three weeks with built-in temperature

Harvest

The harvest is 100% manual. After automatic de-stemming, the grapes are sorted by hand. Only perfect grapes are sent to the temperature-controlled stainless-steel vats.

Vinification/ Maturation

Tasting Notes

The wines produced at Chateau la Vieille Cure are, by tradition, fine wines for connoisseurs and for aging. While some vintages benefit from waiting 10 or more years, most are best appreciated between 4 and 6 years. With a perfect balance of fruit, aromas and tannins, they are ideal accompaniments to a meal, including spiced and spicy dishes, but can be enjoyed at any time.

Serve with

Chateau La Vieille Cure is best paired with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast chicken, roasted braised and grilled dishes. Chateau La Vieille Cure is also good when matched with Asian dishes, rich fish courses like tuna, mushrooms and pasta.
