Sustainability

The official transition to organic conversion was initiated in 2013, with certification planned for the 2016 harvest. This natural approach, adapted to each plot, plays a fundamental role in the quality of the wines. It allows the fruit to draw from the soil all the complexity and finesse of a terroir, to restore them to us, thanks to a patient and precise vinification and aging in barrels carried out according to the traditional method.

General Info

Chateau La Lagune has a long history that dates all the way back to the 16th century, under King Henri IV. This was at the same time the Dutch engineers began the modern age for Bordeaux when they started draining the water from the marshes and swamps. The beautiful, classically styled chateau took decades to build, with construction beginning in about 1715, finishing in 1734.

The chateau was designed by the architect, Baron Victor Louis, who earned fame for his design of the Grand Theater in Bordeaux. By 1730, Chateau La Lagune was already known for producing Bordeaux wine. The property remained under the ownership of the well-known de Sèze family for several generations.

Jumping ahead a few centuries to the modern era, during the 1950s, Chateau La Lagune experienced problems caused by the end of World War 2, along with the economic crisis. Plus, there was the great frost of 1956, which destroyed a large portion of the vineyards in Bordeaux.

In 1958, when George Brunet purchased Chateau La Lagune, only 5 hectares remained planted with vines! It was George Burnet that began a serious program of replanting Chateau La Lagune.

During the tenure of George Burnet, he increased the size of vineyards by purchasing the neighboring Petit La Lagune vineyard. Burnet also brought back the name of Chateau La Lagune, which in the 1950s, was sold as Grand La Lagune.

However, George Brunet also took an economic hit during that era and was forced to sell Chateau La Lagune to the Ducellier family of Champagne Ayala in 1962. Since 2004, Caroline Frey has invested her skill and dedication to elevating Chateau la Lagune to the height of its appellation.

Winemakers Vintage

Maylis de Labordiere (oenologist from 2013-2020 vintages)

The 2019 vintage brought quite capricious weather. The mild, dry winter triggered the early budding of the vines at the end of March. Flowering took place during the wet weather and debudding was carried out in May. Finally, summer brought hot and dry weather. Nevertheless, the terroir saved the vine from excessive water stress.

Vineyards

Veraison began on July 29 and ended between mid-August and the end of August. The La Lagune vineyard is planted to 60% Cabernet Sauvignon, 30% Merlot, and 10% Petit Verdot. The sizeable 90-hectare vineyard of Chateau La Lagune usually has 85 hectares of vines planted. 5 hectares are often fallow, waiting for replanting. The vineyard has a terroir of gravel and sandy soils. The estate however is much larger, covering 150 hectares. Much of that land is devoted to verdant parkland and forests. The best parts of the vineyard are found on the plateau of their 4, sloping gravel, hillsides. The peak elevation on the slopes reaches 15 meters. As you might expect, the concentration of the gravel is at the top of the slopes. You find more sand as travel further down the hills onto the flats.

They also maintain parcels they purchased in 1964, which is located due east, which is gravel and sand over clay soils. Compared with their neighbors, they have a slightly

warmer-microclimate, allowing them to be one of the earlier estates to finish harvesting.

In 2004, the estate began experimenting with organic farming on one parcel of vines. Starting in 2008, Chateau La Lagune began a program of Massal selection allowing them to propagate their vineyards with their own material that comes from their best vines.

Harvest

The Chateau La Lagune harvest began on September 18 with the Merlot and ended on October 9 on the "Mlle L" vineyard. The work carried out by the technical teams throughout the year and the biodynamic management of the vineyard made it possible to overcome fluctuations in climate. The result was a superbly healthy and homogeneous harvest.

Maturation

15-18 months in barriques. 55% new.

Tasting Notes

Dense and deep nose of fragrant blackcurrants, scents of roasted bacon and graphite on the palate, splendid acidity, creamy berries, and grained tannin. Full-bodied yet elegant with finesse. Complex with terrific structure and length. Long aftertaste. Another great effort from this property. Excellent value for money here!

Serve with

Chateau La Lagune is best served at 15.5 degrees Celsius, 60 degrees Fahrenheit. The cool, almost cellar temperature gives the wine more freshness and lift. The wine of Chateau La Lagune is best served with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast chicken, roasted, braised, and grilled dishes.

"Wafting from the glass with aromas of cherries, wild berries and cassis mingled with hints of dark chocolate, pencil shavings and violets, the 2019 La Lagune is medium to full-bodied, broad, and sensual, its ample core of fruit framed by polished tannins and succulent acids. In its elegant, generous style, it's reminiscent of a modern-day version of the brilliant 1990. Drink Date 2025 – 2055.

One of the Médoc's southernmost and most precocious sites, La Lagune occupies two domes of fine gravel, some 1.5 meters deep, that becomes sandier in the vineyard's lower-lying sectors. The trend when replanting has been for Cabernet Sauvignon to displace Merlot on the prime sectors of the vineyard, and farming is organic (certified from 2020 on), with cover crops and less frequent mechanical cultivation than in the past. Winemaking is classical, with gentle pump-overs, and the press wine is carefully selected before inclusion. In the cellar, maturation occurs with some 50% new oak. The result is a rather sensual, seamless wine, with plenty of fleshy charm and fine aging potential, and the 2019 has turned out extremely well."

"The nose is elegant, racy and offers a small power, an aromatic purity as well as a beautiful definition of the fruit. It reveals notes of pulpy wild blackberry, pulpy raspberry, small notes of small wild fruits associated with touches of crushed strawberry, hints of Cuban pepper, caramelization, zan as well as fine hints of sugared mild tobacco. The palate is fruity, well-balanced and offers a juicy/Acidulous frame, a good definition, elegance, gourmandize, a juicy/pulpy/acidulous frame as well as an aromatic purity. On the palate this wine expresses notes of pulpy/juicy cassis, raspberry, small notes of Boysen berry associated with touches of small red berries as well as fine hints of juicy violet plum, toasted, caramelization, sugared mild tobacco and very fine hints of vanilla. Tannins are precise and very finely firm. A beautiful sapid, acidulous and gourmand persistence."
