General Info Château Brane-Cantenac was for many years the home of Lucien Lurton - it is now

owned and run by his son Henri. Its vineyards are located west of the village of Cantenac in the Margaux appellation. Brane Cantenac was perceived throughout much of the 70s and 80s as an underperforming property. Since Henri took over, there has been extensive investment in the cuverie and chai, as well as vastly improved vineyard management techniques. Consequently, the wines at Brane Cantenac now show more weight and concentration, although they still possess that haunting bouquet and quintessential elegance that characterise the wines of

Margaux. It is classified as a 2ème Cru Classé.

> Vintage Margaux, which clearly won the prize in 2015 was not quite as lucky this year. While

2016 Margaux is not at that same level of quality, there are several stunning 2016 Margaux wines. Generally speaking, and we all know how far generalities get you, in many cases, 2016 Margaux differs more as a matter of style with 2015, than overall quality. While 2015 produced wines of opulence and sensuality, 2016 Margaux is focused on precision, purity and freshness. Alcohol levels are lower, and acidities are higher with 2016 Margaux as well. What is important to note with 2016 Margaux is that you find great wines at all levels from the top 1855 Classified Growths to Cru

Bourgeois growers as well.

Margaux is a large appellation in the Medoc, with 1,355 hectares under vine. The size of the Left Bank region goes hand in hand with a naturally diverse array of terroirs. The diversity of soils perforce leads to a lack of homogeneity in the wines. The vineyards with the terroir able to drain the water from the torrential rains, making the region the wettest in decades. We're talking 600-700 mm of water! The terroir was required to handle double duty as the almost, 6 months of rain was followed by one of the longest, dry periods with no rain seen in the region in decades! Add to that, the vintage was running quite late, and it's easy to see what the growers and vineyards were up against. Margaux, which has a slightly, warmer, micro-climate usually competes their harvest a few days earlier than its neighbors to the north. But that was not always the case with 2016 Margaux as some growers did

Vineyards Brane-Cantenac's 75 hectares of vineyards are planted with Cabernet Sauvignon

(55%), Merlot (40%), Cabernet Franc (4.5%) and Carmenère 0.5%, and lie on fine,

"The 2016 Brane-Cantenac is a blend of 70% Cabernet Sauvignon, 27% Merlot, 2% Cabernet Franc and 1% Carmenère picked from 22 September until 17 October (the tiny parcel of Carmenère picked three days later). The yields came in at 51 hectoliters per hectare and it is matured in 75% new oak and 25% one-year-old barrels, the final alcohol level 13.3%. It has a beautifully defined, very detailed bouquet with mineral-rich black fruit laced with cedar and graphite notes, living up to its nom de plume as the "Pauillac of Margaux." The palate is simply the best that I have ever tasted at the estate, without question. This has presence, but also weightlessness, filigree tannin and perfectly pitched acidity, with real intensity and drive. The tension here is outstanding and the persistence is incredibly long. It is not the showiest of all the 2016s by a long stretch, and yet it is everything you could possibly want from a Margaux. Like Beychevelle this year, the 2016 Brane-Cantenac puts recent vintages in the shade, thanks not only to the growing season, but also a new punching down system in their gravity-fed winery that was completed in 2015. Blending 70% Cabernet Sauvignon, 27% Merlot, 2% Cabernet Franc and 1% Carmenère, this wine reached 13.3% with a pH of 3.69. "Henri Lurton, the proprietor here, has been working to improve quality in the vineyard with re-grafting of Merlot to high quality Cabernet Sauvignon as they look to keep freshness and structure in the wines. The vineyard is now planted with 55% Cabernet Sauvignon, 10% Petit Verdot, 5% Cabernet Franc and 1% Carmenère with the remainder Merlot. The 2016 was cropped at 51hl/ha and is 70% Cabernet Sauvignon, 1%, 27% Merlot, 2% Cabernet Franc with a dash of Carmenère. Henri Lurton believes this could be the greatest Brane Cantenac they have made with small berries of ripe Cabernet Sauvignon giving superb balance with great acidity, and intensity without weight, and high levels of integration despite the volume of tannins. Deep in colour, there is a fresh nose of crushed red and black berry fruits. Perfumed, floral and smoky with incense. The palate is pure and fine with ripe blackcurrant and hints of violet. Toasty, smoky notes provide complexity from integrated yet spicy new oak. Silky and lifted through the finish, there is great poise and elegance to this long, classic Margaux."

"The 2016 Brane-Cantenac has been on a roll of late, under the watchful eye of Henri Lurton. This latest bottled vintage is superb. The divine, pure blackberry and bilberry bouquet develops touches of graphite in the glass. The palate is medium bodied with fine tannin, silky-smooth texture and a superb bead of acidity.
