Chateau Siran has a history in the Medoc that dates back to 1428, making it one of
the oldest estates in Margaux. The property took its name from Saint Siran. At one
point in time, Chateau Siran was owned by the Toulouse Lautrec family. The
owners were the grandparents of the famous French painter.

Chateau Siran has been the property of the Miailhe family since 1858, having purchased the estate from the Lautrec family. Chateau Siran has retained their artistic roots. Similar to what

Chateau Siran also created a new label each vintage that features a different artist. However, from the 2005 vintage forward, Siran has retained the same label. In late 2014, Chateau Siran finished a complete renovation and modernization of their cellars and wine making facilities along with their museum. The museum, which is worth a trip to see has a stunning collection of wine related objects including several ancient amphorae, the oldest of which can be dated all the way back to 300 BC. At various points in time, Siran was consulted by Michel Rolland from 1995 to 2004, who was followed by Denis Dubourdieu from 2004. Starting with the 2015 vintage, Chateau Siran began working with Hubert de Bouard of Chateau Angelus and the wines have never been better. In fact, 2015 is finest wine the estate has ever produced!

Vintage

The vintage is characterized by a wet and relatively cool beginning of the season, followed by a very dry summer, at a rarely reached level, and rather warm, with a dry and sunny autumn, with strong thermal amplitudes. As a result, the quality of the grape harvests was very dependent on the part of the work done on the vines in the spring, on the other hand the quality of rooting, which will have more or less responded to the water needs of the plant. The sunshine was generally faithful to the averages, but its particular distribution strongly contributed to the personality of the vintage. After a mild, dry autumn (November and December 2015 with above-average temperatures and 50% rainfall deficit compared to averages, with a constant south current), the months of January and February, until March 10, were mild and wet (1 ° C more than the average and three times the 30-year average over January, with 240 mm!). April was relatively dry, but overcast and with frequent rains, then May and June were rainy, with much lower sunshine than in 2015 and relatively cool (June 1 ° C below average, with only one hot episode at the end of month (33-35 °C)). The flower, between the end of May and the middle of June, forecast harvest around September 26th.

The temperatures of the summer months were close to the averages, August slightly warmer than July, with two peaks of heat, August 15 and 23 to 27, with a high of $36.7\,^{\circ}$ C on the 23rd. From the 28th, the nights were cool, around 15 $^{\circ}$ C. September remained summer until the storm of 13/09. Overall it was mild, with rare rainy episodes, and dry with great temperature differences between day and night. This favored a slow maturation of the grapes, which remained perfectly healthy. October was dry, so that the beginning of the harvest could be delayed until the end of September.

Vineyards

The 25 hectare Left Bank vineyard of Chateau Siran is planted to 44% Merlot, 43% Cabernet Sauvignon, 12% Petit Verdot, 1% Cabernet Franc. Located in the southern part of the Margaux appellation, the grapes are produced from soils made up of a

deep layer of gravel. Both powerful and delicate, they express the perfect balance between tannin, fruit and acidity. The vineyard has a vine density of 10,000 vines

per hectare. On average the vines are 32 years of age.

Harvest

September 26th, 2016. Handpicked in 60L crates

Vinification

To produce the wine of Chateau Siran, the wine is vinified in temperature controlled, stainless steel vats. Malolactic fermentation takes place in tank. The wine is aged in 35% new, French oak barrels for 12 months before bottling.

Tasting Notes

Produced from soils made up of a deep layer of gravel, the wines of Siran are typical of the great Margaux growths. Both powerful and delicate, they express the perfect balance between tannin, fruit and acidity. They are long-ageing wines, which over time develop sweetness on the palate, giving a characteristic silky and velvety mouth-feel. Made from a subtle blend of Merlot, Cabernet Sauvignon and Petit Verdot, Château Siran generally expresses finesse, femininity and silkiness rather than the raw power and virility of some Médoc wines. The high percentage of Petit Verdot, which can be as much as 15% of the final blend in some years, brings a spicy finish which enhances the unique character of the wines of Château Siran. Château Siran displays charm when young but is also a wine of very long ageing potential. Wine enthusiasts particularly appreciate the complexity of its aromas that it develops over time.

Serve with

Chateau Siran is best served with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast chicken, roasted, braised and grilled dishes. Chateau Siran is a perfect match with Asian dishes, hearty fish courses like tuna, mushrooms and pasta as well as cheese.

"The alcohol level is 13.9% with a pH of 3.61. The nose, for want of a better word, is very charming. No, not powerful nor is it flamboyant, yet the aromas are nicely focused, and it has a disarming sense of purity: blackberry, bilberry and just a very faint hint of liquorice.
