Château Duhart-Milon takes its name from Milon, the Pauillac village where its vineyards lie, and their former owner, said to be the widow of a pirate in the service of Louis XV. Classified as a Fourth Growth in 1855, Duhart-Milon was headed steadily downhill until the Rothschild family rescued the estate -- a familiar pattern in Pauillac -- in 1962. Classified 4th growth in 1855. The fine wine from Château Duhart-Milon is often described as a classic version of the Pauillac appellation. It has a distinguished and reserved character.

Incidentally, there's no real Château at Duhart-Milon: the wines are finished in a large warehouse off a side street in Pauillac. But as long as this helps keep costs down, we don't mind. The vat room and cellars were extended and totally renovated in 2003. The current owner is Baron Eric de Rothschild and the winemaker is Charles Chevalier.

General Info

Vintage A year with ideal weather conditions, except for a rainy August. The harvest under sunny skies reassured us of the vintage's quality. 1996 was a superb vintage for wines of the Medoc scoring 96 points out of a possible 100 from wine critic Robert Parker. Owned by Chateau Lafite Rothschild, Baron Eric de Rothschild's words were, 'It would have been nonsense not to acquire such a great neighbouring vineyard'. And the critics seem to agree too, regularly awarding 90 points or more for the new vintages. Parker gave the 1996 vintage 90 points, calling it 'rich and intense, with considerable finesse' and possibly 'the finest Duhart produced since the 1982'.

Vineyards

The vineyard of Chateau Duhart-Milon is on the Milon hillside on the western side of Chateau Lafite Rothschild. It is located in Pauillac, a small village and port. The estate is made up of 152 hectares, including 73 hectares of vineyards (Cabernet Sauvignon 67% and Merlot 33%). 7500 feet of vines per hectare. The average age of the vineyard is 30 years. A single team has managed the Chateau since 1962, it is the same team which supervises Château Lafite Rothschild too.

Climate

Maritime, moderated by the Gironde estuary and Atlantic Ocean, pine forests provide insulation from strong winds off the ocean and help to lessen summer temperatures.

Maturation

1996 had a higher percentage of Cabernet Sauvignon at 85% and 15% Merlot. The wine is aged for 14 months in oak barrels, half of which are renewed each vintage. The high quality of this vintage reflects the meticulous attention from Charles Chevalier, Lafite's director in charge of their estates.

Tasting Notes

A lively, fruity wine with excellent olfactive expression. Plenty of substance on the palate, while remaining supple and balanced. This wine may be aged for a long time, and is somewhat similar to the 1986 vintage.

Serve with

Pairs well with red meat, game, Lamb and strong cheese. Decant 2+ hours prior to serving. Serve at 16-18 degrees celcius.
