General Info	The Cazes family, which heads Château Lynch-Bages, are the proud new owners of Château Haut-Batailley (since March 2017), an 1855 Grand Cru Classé in Pauillac owned previously by the Des Brest-Borie family. Both families have had strong roots in the Pauillac and Médoc landscape for generations.	U. H.
Vintage	Château Haut-Batailley, acquired by the Brest-Borie family in the 1930s, was until now managed by François-Xavier Borie. "We are delighted that Château Haut- Batailley has been accepted into the fold of the Cazes family, who are committed to continuing the work undertaken at the estate. We're confident that they will maintain the identity and character of the property," said François-Xavier Borie. A vintage of severe climatic contrasts, 2018 took place in two phases. After a	4
-	particularly mild and wet spring, summer settled in July, bringing plenty of sunshine that lasted until October. The beautiful climatic conditions of summer thus ended any mildew pressure to which the vineyard was subjected during the spring season. "The early start of the season was nerve-racking because of the mildew pressure," Jean-Charles Cazes said. "We had to monitor the vines constantly and react. But we were equally worried about the dry period. We were concerned about getting vine blockage, like in 2003, but it didn't happen. The rains we had in the spring really helped the vines sail through and reach full maturity. Our harvest dates are pretty	Quero Co
	helped the vines sail through and reach full maturity. Our harvest dates are pretty much on average, a little early for Lynch Bages, but again not like 2003. Sorting wasn't really a problem, everything was sanitary. The vintage reminds me of 2010, but more forward, like 2016. I asked Cazes about their biggest challenge this year. "The challenge was not to overdo extraction," he said. "That was the biggest challenge in the cellar. We had smaller berries, so the ratio of skin to juice was high. Vineyards	Château Haut-Batailley today comprises some 40 hectares, 22 hectares of which are already planted. In terms of grape variety, the property has 70% Cabernet Sauvignon, 25% Merlot and 5% Cabernet Franc. Its vines are on average 35 years old. The property also has its own technical facilities, in perfect working order. At 22 ha it is a relatively small property in Medoc terms and combines a fine blend of Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot and Cabernet Franc to create a wine which has fully deserved reputation for expressing the power and punch of the very finest Pauillac's with a degree of sweetness, freshness, and subtlety. In recent years the estate has been beautifully managed by Francois's Grandson Francois-Xavier Borie, whose style and philosophy has been very much the same as the one he has at his own property Ch Grand Puy-Lacoste, to allow the vineyard to express itself to a maximum, little interference and let nature take its course to allow each year to express its own personality.	
Harvest	The grape harvest began on September 21 st and ended on October 8 th .	
Maturation	The vatting period lasts around 3 wks. Alcoholic fermentation occurs during eight to ten days, with temperatures held around 28°C (depending on the quality of the vintage). A soft extraction is achieved by daily pumping-over of the juice which aids fermentation and the gradual development of phenolic components in the wine. Maceration continues for around ten days. During this time, each vat's temperature is strictly controlled and adjusted according to its grapes' potential. This is followed by the malolactic fermentation which stabilizes the wine and reduces its acidity, or handing its round and supple character. Aread in 60% new French calc

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Tasting Notes The blend of the 2018 vintage includes a higher proportion of Merlot than what has been used in previous vintages. The wines display great concentration and intensity alongside high alcohol. On the finish, seductive velvety elegance and freshness overlays an attractive weave of fine tannins. Serve with Chateau Haut Batailley is best served with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast chicken, roasted, braised, and grilled dishes. Chateau Haut Batailley is also good with Asian dishes, hearty fish courses like tuna, mushrooms, and pasta. "This is a lovely wine from the second vintage under Lynch Bages' ownership, full of power and poise and controlled precision. It has a slightly unusual blend owing to a greater proportion of Merlot than has been used in previous vintages, but it doesn't suffer in terms of concentration due to the thick skins and structure of the Merlots in 2018, and what you get instead is a creamy, velvety texture through the mid palate. It has lots of tannins, but they have the enrobed quality that comes from the higher than usual alcohols and are extremely seductive. Bold cassis, iron, and cedar tones on the nose - you can feel the solar nature of the vintage in the power of fruit. "The 2018 Haut-Batailley has a sweet, opulent bouquet of macerated black cherries, blueberry, hints of fresh fig and pressed violets. "The grand vin 2018 Château Haut-Batailley is a beauty and is comprised of 59% Cabernet Sauvignon and 41% Merlot brought up in 60% new French oak.
