They descended from John Lynch, a young Irishman from Galway who was chased out of his country in 1691. In the 18th century, Count Jean-Baptiste Lynch, mayor of Bordeaux, inherited the estate and handed over management to his brother Michel Lynch, who was also mayor of Pauillac during the French Revolution. Jean-Charles Cazes, highly respected in the Médoc for his experience in viticulture and winemaking, bought the property in 1934. With his son André, he devoted all his energy to Lynch-Bages for more than 35 years. In 1974, his grand-son Jean-Michel Cazes set about restructuring and managing the estate and recently, in 2006, handed over the running of the property to his son Jean-Charles.

Vintage

Located to the west of Pauillac, our white vineyard saw a late flowering, due to its cooler, more clayey terroir. At the end of July, we noted a reasonable grape load on the vines, with homogeneous clusters that were evenly distributed over the vine stocks, especially the Muscadelle and Semillon.

Maturity checks at the end of August revealed good sanitary conditions with a moderate increase in alcoholic strength. The rains in early September forced us to pick the leaves on the second side and to carry out a sanitary removal of the immature clusters. This finally allowed us to put back the picking by around ten days.

Vineyards

Stretching over some 100 hectares in the commune of Pauillac, the vineyards of Lynch-Bages lie entirely upon the soil of choice for great wines, formed along the estuary by the alluvia from the gravel of Médoc. The property sits among favourably designed hillcrests located south and southwest of the city. This particular topography allows for both a natural drainage of soils to the river and, with help of the water table in shallow areas, a fine feeding of water for the vines. There is also a 6-hectare plot of white vines established by Jean-Michel in 1990. Lying

further inland than the red vineyards, this plot comprises 53% Sauvignon Blanc (a recent increase), 32% Semillon and 15% Muscadelle (both reined in a little in recent

years).

Harvest

Harvesting began on 19 September 19th - 2 weeks later than usual - and ended on 26 September with the last of the Sauvignon boasting between 12.5 and 13% alcohol by volume, and a steady acidity, but only a modest yield (30 hl/ha).

Vinification/ Maturation After settling, the bulk of the white harvest was divided into new and one-wine barrels, whilst one third went into stainless steel vats. Gentle fermentations at low temperatures revealed fresh, striking aromas. From November onwards, ageing was optimised by the twice weekly « stirring » of the lees thanks to our new system of individual barrel rotation. The wines thus spend the winter stabilizing and being refined. After 6 months of maturing in wood (50% new), the wine was pumped over in vats for fining and put into barrels in the spring.

Tasting Notes

The 2013 like all late-harvest vintages, is an excellent vintage for white wines. Blanc de Lynch-Bages couples both floral and fruity aromas, a generous mid palate and a long finish. Aromas of fresh and exotic fruits from Sauvignon Blanc, dried and candied fruits and white flowers from Sémillon and delicate woody and vanilla notes from Muscadelle come together to make this complex Lynch-Bages White. The palate balances freshness and strength with a round, ample yet elegant structure. Characteristic of fine Bordeaux whites, Lynch-Bages White is lively and explosive in its early youth and retains impressive length on the palate for the duration of its life.
