| General Info | 5th cru classified in 1855. Chateau Lynch Moussas (like the Château Lynch Bages) owes its name to the Lynch family, a family of Irish origin established in France since 1691, which acquired it during the 18th century. Phylloxera in the late 19th century and the economic crisis of the early 20th century have undermined the estate which was bought in 1919 by Jean Castéja. After the arrival of Emile Castéja on the estate in 1969, a major planting, rebuilding and restructuring program was put in place to restore the estate to its former glory. His son Phillippe Castéja is now at the head of Chateau Lynch Moussas which makes part of the large portfolio of the Castéja family managed through the wine merchant Borie Manoux. |

| Vintage | In years when Bordeaux winegrowers face adverse weather conditions, they usually speak of a millésime de vigneron, meaning that only the most perspicacious, courageous and committed professionals will be able to produce quality wine. This was the case in 2008, where a rainy and cool spring impeded vine growth and meant a late start for blossoms. In addition, a relatively cold and slightly moist August slowed the ripening of grapes. With the harvest period beginning about 10 days after the date selected the previous year, 2008 was therefore a rather late vintage. In such a case, the behavior of the vine depends on the quality of the soil in which it is planted, but also to a great extent on the winegrower's expertise and the hours of labour expended by personnel in the vineyard, before the harvest. |
| Vineyards | Chateau Lynch-Moussas' wine originates from the estate's 57 hectares of vineyards morcellated through the commune of Pauillac. The soil for these vineyards is typical of the Pauillac consisting mostly of gravel over a limestone subsoil. The vines are divided between Cabernet Sauvignon (70%) and Merlot (30%). Fermentation and maceration on for 15-20 days in thermo-regulated vats. Aging for 18 months in oak barrels (50% in oak barrels new and 50% in one-wine barrels). |
| Maturation | This wine spent 14-18 months in oak barrels. Aged 60% in new barrels. |
| Tasting Notes | The color is dark. The intense nose is marked by red fruits. On the palate, the wine is full-bodied and ample, affordable in the early years while providing good care |
| Serve with | Rack of lamb with porcini mushrooms, leg seven-hour lamb with broad beans, beef tenderloin with mushrooms. |

"Tasted at the UGC 2008 tasting in London. This has a light, autumnal bouquet with blackberry, wild hedgerow, cedar and a touch of tobacco. It would benefit from more vigour but nicely defined and natural. This has a fleshier mouth-feel than I expected, more approachable with better fruit concentration, although the finish is a little muffled at the moment. Certainly, going in the right direction and it slips down the throat with ease. Drink 2012-2020. Tasted October 2010."

"En primeur barrel sample. A blend of 77% Cabernet Sauvignon and 23% Merlot cropped at 44hl/ha, the Lynch Moussas is reticent on the nose, especially juxtaposed next to Batailley. The palate is medium-bodied, nicely balanced, foursquare but well defined with tobacco, cedar-infused black fruits. Not a long-term '08, but it has a degree of elegance rarely found in this estate. Medium-term, classic Pauillac. Tasted April 2009."

"An attractive nose here, the fruit showing cleaner lines than some grander wines in this vintage in this appellation. It has a crunchy, red berry fruit character to it. The palate is supple and gently juicy, with a fine fruit character, and a sense of tobacco and spice behind. The structure is a little soft, the overall feel integrated, the tannins only showing towards the middle and end on a second taste. This is a good effort for Lynch-Moussas especially considering the vintage. From a 2008 Bordeaux tasting at four years of age. 15.5/20 (Nov 2012)"

"Rather an inexpressive nose to this wine, and what I do get has a slightly warm, hot-smoked feel to it. Rather bold and shell-like substance on the palate, within this a frame of fruit which seems quite stretched although it has a rounder substance on the finish. Rather supple in fact and easy-going. The tannins are there but are soft and in keeping with the rest of the wine. Seems to have a little more structure towards the end. Needs time but this will drink earlier than some of the other wines I think."
