General Info The Château was founded in the 18th century by a member of the Lynch Family. We

can trace the origin of the "Moussas" name back to the 16th century. In 1919 the property was purchased by the Castéja family, at that time also owner of Duhart-Milon and later was inherited by Emile Castéja. Philippe Castéja, Emile Castéja's son, has been in charge of the property and its vineyards since. Château Lynch-Moussas is a typical Pauillac exhibiting a dark colour, a fruitful bouquet, a lot of softness with

ripe tannins.

Vintage In 2016, there were two main trends in the weather as we experienced it in Pauillac:

– a very wet winter and spring: more than half of the annual rainfall came in the first

four months of the year, including a record 240 mm in January;

 $\boldsymbol{-}$ an extremely dry summer and autumn without any significant rainfall, resulting in a

water deficit at the end of the year.

As a consequence of the summer drought, the grapes were numerous but remained rather small, making for density and concentration. High temperatures in August and September allowed for slow ripening and excellent maturity, so that the harvest started with the Merlot on 26 September and continued in perfect conditions until 14 October.

In the vat house, each grape variety and each plot were, as usual, vinified separately in order to let their intrinsic character shine through. The wines, which have now been blended, offer remarkable colour, intense fruit and spice aromas and a dense texture of very rich and well-rounded tannins. Its density and substance make the 2016 vintage comparable with the finest so far this century.

Vineyards Chateau Lynch-Moussas' wine originates from the estate's 57 hectares of vineyards morcellated through the commune of Pauillac. The soil for these vineyards is typical

of the Pauillac consisting mostly of gravel over a limestone subsoil. The vines are

divided between Cabernet Sauvignon (72%) and Merlot (25%).

Harvest Harvested between 3 and 19 October.

Vinification/ 15 to 20 days of fermentation in thermo regulated stainless steel tanks. Aged in

Maturation French oak barrels (about 50 % of new barrels) for 18 months.

Tasting Notes Purple color. Expressive nose with fruity (blackberry, blackcurrant), floral, exotic

wood, cedar and tobacco perfumes. On the palate, this wine is fresh, fruity, lively,

with very elegant, deep, and high-quality tannins. Long finish.

Serve with Risotto with ceps, leg of lamb, beef fillet, doe stew, mutton chops.

"The 2016 Lynch Moussas is a blend of 17% Merlot an 83% Cabernet Sauvignon cropped at 48 hectoliters per hectare between 3 and 19 October. Matured in 60% new oak and the remainder one year old, this has a concentrated bouquet that offers tobacco-infused black fruit, briary and then with aeration, veins of pencil lead. The palate is medium-bodied with firm tannin cloaked in plenty of black fruit, quite spicy for Lynch Moussas with a touch of orange rind developing towards the finish. I appreciate the salinity on the aftertaste here. This is excellent and may well surpass the impressive 2015 last year. Drink 2022 - 2045."
