Jean-François de Pontet, royal governor of the Médoc, combined several vineyard plots in Pauillac in the early 18th century. Years later, his descendants added neighbouring vines in a place named Canet. This was the beginning of one of the largest estates in the Médoc, which quite naturally added the name of its founder to that of the land registry reference. A century later, Pontet-Canet was included in the famous 1855 classification, thereby confirming its membership among the elite of the Médoc. This privileged position did not go unnoticed by one of the most important Bordeaux shippers of the time, Herman Cruse, who bought the estate in 1865. He built new cellars, modernised the winemaking facilities, and established the wine's reputation around the world. The Cruse family owned Pontet-Canet for 110 years, until another shipper (from Cognac CRU CLASSE . this time), Guy Tesseron, acquired it in 1975. Currently owned by Guy Tesseron's sons, Alfred, and Gérard, this means that Pontet-Canet has belonged to only three millio families in over two centuries. Jean-Michel Comme. Winemaker Vintage After an especially mild winter, the 2020 growing season began with a very warm CHÂTEAU March and April (2.25°C warmer than average), which brought about an early bud-PONTET-CANET break in the vines on 21st March and with it the happy prospect of an early harvest! The vine cycle thus got off to an almost perfect start. However, the first period of wet PAUILLAC weather, which came at the end of April and particularly during the weekend of 8th May, brought 80mm (3.15 inches) of rain in the space of a few hours. Our Cabernet vines then enjoyed 3 weeks of fine, sunny weather during which they flowered quickly. With the new moon on 23rd May, conditions quickly changed: rain fell heavily until 20th June. We had no wish to relive what we experienced in the 2018 vintage, when our vines were subject to a severe attack of downy mildew. Having learnt from previous vintages, we made sure that we were well equipped to fight off the fungus with purpose, cohesive teamwork, and innovation. We prepared horsetail tea sprays together with decoctions of willow and buckthorn that we had picked from the fields at the estate. These were applied on a daily basis by our vineyard team and enabled the vines to build up their defenses throughout this critical period. The results were to be seen in mid-July at the time of the veraison: very little of the crop was lost to disease, and the vintage was spared! 2020 was never going to be a smooth, stress-free vintage, though. Boiling-hot weather at the beginning of August was followed by violent rainstorms (85mm/3.35 inches), which swelled the grapes and weakened the skins. By halting soil ploughing earlier than usual and not trimming the vine shoots, the leaves and weeds were able to evaporate this surplus water, and this allowed the berries to regain their normal size. We knew right from the start of the season that this 2020 vintage would be a very early one, and the harvesting dates soon confirmed it. 2020 proved to be a year of challenges, which our new technical director, Mathieu Bessonnet, rose to in brilliant fashion. Thanks to our biodynamic approach, and the vine-growing and wine-making practices that have been established, together with the sterling efforts of all the teams, this new Pontet-Canet vintage is once again a faithful reflection of its terroir. Thirty years after their arrival in Pauillac, the Tesserons can be proud of having gradually restructured the Vineyards entire vineyard as well as renovating the cellars and service buildings. Château Pontet-Canet is located in the

heart of the Pauillac appellation, just south of châteaux Mouton Rothschild and d'Armailhac. It has the poor gravelly soil typical of the greatest vineyards. In fact, the soil has so much gravel and sand that it is difficult to

Vineyards	imagine that anything could grow there at all. The château's winegrowing philosophy is to intervene as little as
	possible and as naturally as possible in the vineyard. Only traditional viticultural and cultivation practices are
	used. Chemical weed killers are banned in keeping with environmental protection,
	and priority is given to the vine's long-term health. Fertilisers are uniquely organic, and only used on plots that
	genuinely require extra nutrition. This helps to maintain a good balance and self-regulated low yields, as well
	as to respect the vines, reflect the terroir, and produce pure, natural wine. In 2003, a purification station was
	built. 2005 was the first harvest using biodynamic practices throughout the whole property of 81 hectares. In
	2005, the second vat room was restored and modified at the image of the first one which dates back to the
	19th century, with concrete truncated cone- shaped vats allowing fermentation by natural gravity flow,
	without the use of pressure or pumping. A part of the vineyard is worked with horses since 2008. Soil: quaterny

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Reviews *"While Justine Tesseron declined my request to taste at the property, I was able to acquire a bottle of the 2020 Pontet-Canet for review. The wine starts strong, wafting from the glass with attractive aromas of cherries, sweet berries and plum preserve mingled with lilac and licorice, but that's followed by a medium to full-bodied, firm and extracted palate that lacks the amplitude and flesh to conceal the rather drying tannins which dominate the earthy finish. It's an open secret among Bordeaux insiders that this estate—which has benefited from such significant and laudable investments, and which was on such an upward trajectory through 2011 has been a perplexingly erratic performer since 2012, intermingling successful vintages with relative failures, and the 2020 only confirms that. While the 2020 isn't by any means a flawed wine, and time may well be kind to it, it doesn't transcend this estate's fifth growth status, even if this château's terroir clearly has the potential to."*

"The 2020 Pontet-Canet is a blend of 60% Cabernet Sauvignon, 32% Merlot, 4% Cabernet Franc and 4% Petit Verdot, aging in 50% new French oak barriques, 35% concrete amphorae and 15% in one-year-old barrels. Harvest began on the 14th of September for the Merlot, and the final lot of Cabernet Sauvignon was harvested on 30th September. Opaque purple black in color, it needs significant aeration and swirling to coax out evocative notes of black cherry preserves, raspberry pie, blackcurrant pastilles and damp soil, before launching into gorgeous floral and spice notions of red roses, cinnamon stick, star anise and cardamom, with a waft of crushed rocks. The medium to full-bodied palate reveals a lot of depth and polish, delivering mouth-coating red and black fruits with loads of fragrant earth and floral sparks, framed by velvety tannins and seamless freshness, finishing long and mineral tinged. This is a singular, fascinating expression of the vintage and highly recommended!

"The difference in our wine is really how we work in the vineyard," said Justine Tesseron, who now works very closely with her father Alfred Tesseron, owner of Château Pontet-Canet. "Every year we go to another level. First, we have great terroir. My grandfather was avant-garde when he chose our site. Then with the approach

my father developed—biodynamics. But, as you know, every year is challenging because of the conditions. In 2018, we lost two-thirds of production because of mildew. In 2020 we were very scared. We didn't want to have the same situation. Our vineyard people were very motivated. We didn't miss any treatments—even on Saturday and Sunday. We HAD to be in the vineyard. Everyone was there. In the end, we didn't lose any crops due to mildew. We kept it contained and it did not spread to the grapes." "It was also challenging because of the very warm, dry days," she added. "We had a bit of drought. But all the treatments we use, based on plants, have meant that the vineyard is in good balance. It was not too much affected by the drought. At Pontet-Canet we don't deleaf or do green harvest. The leaves protected the grapes." I asked Justine about the rains that occurred in mid-August—85 millimeters (3.35 inches)—nearly a month after the start of veraison. She said, "Yes, I think we managed the rain well. Mathieu Bessonnet, our technical director, decided to leave the grass growing between the rows this year, in anticipation of water. The grass was quite high. It managed to soak up a lot of the water. The berries were in good condition afterwards. We did not get dilution." In the end, Pontet-Canet canet through with yields that were just slightly lower than 2019, which was a relatively generous year for this estate. And the wine? Absolutely singular. Absolutely Pontet-Canet."

"Composed of 60% Cabernet Sauvignon, 32% Merlot, 4% Cabernet Franc, and 4% Petit Verdot, the 2020 Pontet-Canet is deep garnet-purple colored. It needs a lot of swirling and aeration to coax out notes of crushed blackcurrants, blueberry compote, and candied violets, leading to suggestions of allspice, fertile loam, kirsch, and dark chocolate with a touch of Indian spices. The medium-bodied palate delivers a firm backbone of grainy tannins with loads of bright, perfumed red and black fruits and seamless acidity, finishing long and fragrant. This is stunning."

"Highly successful Pontet, one of the few Pauillac's that, for me, overperforms on its 2019. Inky purple with ruby reflections in colour. It has personality and is a little old school in the best possible way. Recommended. They have avoided the over-concentrated feel of some Pauillac's in the vintage, while remaining true to the appellation. 4% Petit Verdot completes the blend, 50% new oak 35% amphoras, 15% one-year barrels. First full vintage for Mathieu Bessonnet who replaced the previous long-term director Jean-Michel Comme in 2020. 100% first wine, as it has been for the past four years. 45% will be aged in new oak barrels, 15% one year, 40% in amphoras. The mildew pressure was stressful in the early part of the year, but they had learnt from 2018, and brought in the

"The 2020 Pontet Canet, which was picked from 14 September, has quite a plush bouquet with blackberry, raspberry coulis, cedar, and light touches of espresso that hover in the background. Fine delineation. The palate is medium-bodied with firm tannins. There remains a noticeable and indeed pleasurable sprinkling of black pepper complementing that black fruit. Quite structured on the finish (more so than previous vintages) with a gentle but insistent grip. Unquestionably this is more classically styled than the recently blind-tasted 2019 and should mature well in bottle. Excellent."

"The 2020 Pontet Canet, picked from 14 to 30 September, has a well-defined bouquet with scents of black cherries, raspberry, crushed iris, and violet. "The 2020 Pontet-Canet is captivating effort from the Tesseron family. The intensely perfumed, savory bouquet is immediately alluring. Deep and substantial, the 2020 is luxuriously rich from start to finish. Swaths of incisive tannin wrap around a core of dark red cherry fruit, gravel, dried herbs and rose petal, and a whole range of floral and savory accents lend aromatic presence. The Pontet-Canet is often a charmer en primeur, but the 2020 comes across as quite serious. I can't wait to see how it develops. As always, one of the signatures of Pontet-Canet is a high proportion of Merlot vis-à-vis its peers among top Left Bank châteaux that lends tremendous midpalate weight. In 2020 production is within historical norms. Mildew pressure was high, but not as severe as in 2018, when two-thirds of the crop was lost in a single day. Harvest took place September 14–30, a bit more of a compact time frame than normal, and a good 7–10 days earlier than is typically the case. "The flagship from this estate, the 2020 Château Pontet-Canet is a beauty based on 60% Cabernet Sauvignon, 32% Merlot, and 4% each of Cabernet Franc and Petit Verdot, brought up in 50% new oak, with 35% in amphora. The palate has a silky texture, ultra-finely-knit tannin, vivid alcohol, medium-bodied intensity, increased acidity on the finish with slightly greenish components. "On the nose, fruity, elegant, aromatic, precise and offers delicacy, concentration, complexity, delicate freshness, richness (but well-balanced, slightly tight/offering a rather contained richness). It reveals notes of bright blackberry, fresh/juicy blackcurrant and subtle notes of pulpy strawberry combined with hints of violet, lily/iris as well as touches of tonka bean, fresh flowers, a nice element of gravel, pulpy/chunky berries, hints of camphor, tea, an imperceptible hint of saffron, sweet spices and pepper (in the background). On the palate, nicely juicy/fresh, well balanced, frank (in the attack), dynamic and offers a nice roundness, a nice structure, density/fattiness but freshness, depth, carried precision/fine structure. The wine expresses notes of pulpy/fresh blackcurrant, fleshy/fresh blackberries and subtle notes of pulpy raspberry associated with small touches of blueberry, lily, graphite/wet stone, cardamom, a nice touch of gravel as well as hints of pulpy/fresh/acidic blueberries, delicate floral hints, discreet hints of fresh hazelnut, tonka bean, a subtle hint of cardamom, black tea, an imperceptible hint of roasted hazelnut, bergamot, and mocha.
