Pessac Léognan

Standing at the gateway to Bordeaux, Château Brown stretches between three towns: Gradignan, Villenave-d'Ornon and Léognan. The proximity of these towns gives the estate a mild climate ideal for the ripening of fruit and thus conducive to making high-quality wines. Set in the oldest Bordeaux wine region (the northern Graves) Château Brown is to be found right at the heart of the world-famous Pessac-Léognan appellation. Château Brown, as its name suggests, bears testimony to the close links that have always existed between the Bordeaux region and the Anglo-Saxons. Founded in the late Middle Ages when Aquitaine belonged to England, Château Brown owes its name to the wealthy Scottish wine trader John Lewis Brown, who settled in Bordeaux in the late 18th century. An enthusiast of wines and art, this epicurean passed on not only his name but also his passions to his grandson, the animal painter John Lewis Brown. The owners came and went at Château Brown over the centuries and the estate alternated between glory and neglect. It was not until the late 20th century that the estate was fully restored to its former eminent position under the impulse of Bernard Barthe, the master of the château for the last decade. In December 2004, he decided to place his life's work in the hands of a famous dynasty of wine traders: the Mau family, in partnership with the Dutch Dirkzwager family. Stéphane Derenoncourt is the consultant for Brown Rouge.

Vintage One of the characteristics of 2011 was an extremely dry spring. Based on the

measured rainfall in April, May & June this was the driest spring since 1949. Happily, summer brought some rain which allowed the vine to continue its growth. With a dry

September, we were able to harvest in optimal conditions.

Vineyards Average vine age is 20yrs, in gravel with clay subsoil

Harvest picking by hand with trays – double sorting operation at the vat house (bunches, then

berries). Merlot: 16.09.2011 - 22.09.2011 Cabernet Sauvignon: 26.09.2011 - 03.10.2011

Petit Verdot: 23.09.2011

Vinification/ Pre-fermentary maceration at 6° for around 4 days – alcoholic fermentation in 100 hl **Maturation** stainless steel vats – post-fermentary maceration at 30° for around a week– running-

stainless steel vats – post-fermentary maceration at 30° for around a week– running-off after tasting each vat – vertical pressing. Malolactic fermentation: one-third in new barrels. Ageing in French oak barrels, 40% in new barrels during 14 month/s

Tasting Notes Good, deep, vibrant colour. Lovely fruit purity on the nose, with some of that vegetal,

chicory-like firmness to the black fruit and a sappy feeling of freshness with modest oak influence. On the palate the tannins are more refined than in Preuillac, a smaller grain to the tannins and more silky texture. The svelte black fruit is still keen and quite lean and muscular, but there is a lovely sense of burgeoning blackcurrant sweetness. Good acidity, a bit of spice and charry character building on the finish, and

already tasting quite delicious. Should be very good.
