General Info For the past four centuries, Château Haut Bailly has overlooked 2

For the past four centuries, Château Haut Bailly has overlooked 28 hectares of vines in a single block. These grow on soil consisting of sand and gravel from the Tertiary period with a fossil stone subsoil. Haut Bailly's reputation as one of the very finest wines of Bordeaux was established in the 19th century. Haut-Bailly was bought by the Sanders family in 1955 and was run by Jean Sanders until 1998 when Robert G. Wilmers, an American banker, purchased it. Robert G. Wilmers continues to emphasize quality in all aspects of production, combining a blend of tradition and modernity with respect for the environment. Château Haut-Bailly's unique terroir produces wines that are outstandingly reliable, and whose prestige is due to an inimitable style marked by finesse and elegance.

Bob Wilmers passed away in December 2017 at age 83. The estate is now managed by Chris Wilmers the son of Bob Wilmers.

Today, the estate is directed by Veronique Sanders, the fourth generation of her family associated with Haut-Bailly.

Vintage Unprecedented weather and extreme seasons!

Winter 2019 was short-lived. After a particularly cold January, February was exceptionally mild (28°C). The early budburst (15 days in advance) gave us fears of spring frosts, which were fortunately avoided thanks to the nighttime mobilization of our team. On five separate occasions, fires were lit to fight against this risk (March 27th & 28th, April 13th, May 5th & 6th).

An unusual freshness in May slowed the growth of the plant and returned us to a traditional growing calendar.

Spring ended with several successive heat waves from the end of May, followed by two intense periods in June (26th & 27th) and July (22nd-25th).

The early summer weather accelerated the vegetative development and the vine demonstrated once again its incredible resistance. Generous growth encouraged us to perform green harvests. At the end of July, a providential storm during a period of drought gave us 40mm of rain and allowed a quick and homogeneous veraison, along with the cooler temperatures of early August. Maturation developed in ideal weather conditions, with alternating warm and sunny days with cool nights.

Vineyards

The Haut-Bailly estate accounts for 33 hectares of the Médoc, of which 30 hectares are vineyard, largely in a single block on a gravel *croupe*. The soils are a mixture of sand and Tertiary gravel over *Faluns de Léognan*, a subsoil rich in sandstone and ancient fossilised shells. The vines themselves are mainly Cabernet Sauvignon (64%), which are planted on the upper parts of the *croupe* and slopes where the drainage is best, with 30% Merlot, which are planted on those plots where the soils are richer in clay. The remaining 6% is Cabernet Franc, and overall, the planting density is an admirable 10000 vines/ha.

Harvest

After a fine summer and a magnificent month of September, the harvest took place from September 23rd to October 10th in favorable conditions.

A generous crop was handpicked by a high-spirited troop of international pickers. The sugar concentration of the grapes, their phenolic richness and a natural acidity are signs of a great vintage. Harvest: September 23rd to October 10th

Winemaking

The vinification took place at 24°C in order to preserve the perfect freshness and elegance despite the high degrees in alcohol. In small oak barriques (55% new) for 16 months and is bottled unfined and unfiltered.

"The 2019 Haut-Bailly unwinds in the glass with complex aromas of dark berries, bay leaf, loamy soil, and cigar wrapper, framed by a discreet patina of new oak. Full-bodied, velvety, and elegantly muscular, it's powerful and concentrated, with lively acids and an abundance of ripe but youthfully assertive structuring tannin that will demand some patience. Drink Date 2029 – 2065.

Haut-Bailly now boasts one of Bordeaux's grander new wineries, but the 2019 vintage at this address reminds us that the old facilities were more than capable of delivering excellence too! Winemaking here is rather gentle, with comparatively cool fermentation temperatures and a modest 50% new oak, yet the 2019s are rather structured, serious wines that will demand a bit of patience, reflecting a more classically proportioned, elegant style than the more flamboyant 2018. As usual, Cabernet Sauvignon represents slightly over half of the blend, including a block of ancient, more than 100-year-old vines in front of the château itself." - WK, Wine Advocate

"Deep garnet-purple colored, it leaps from the glass with vivacious notes of blackcurrant cordial, black raspberries, and plum preserves with a tantalizing undercurrent of candied violets, dark chocolate, menthol, and licorice plus a touch of Chinese five spice. Medium to full-bodied, the palate is achingly elegant, showing off perfumed black fruit layers with a firm frame of very fine-grained, silt-like tannins and seamless freshness, finishing with incredible persistence and fragrance. "The yield is 49hl/ha in 2019, similar to the average. The wine will be aged for 16-18 months in 50% new French oak. Deep ruby colour, with notes of sweet violets, earthy bramble fruits and sappy oak. The palate is earthy and savoury in flavour but glossy in texture, with the mouthcoating and grippy tannins extremely refined. Black fruit builds in tandem with subtle and spicy oak through to a long, fine finish.

"The 2019 Haut-Bailly, matured in 50% new oak and bottled in April 2021, has a stunning, classy, and sophisticated bouquet of blackberry, melted tar, Earl Grey and light minerally scents. This is extremely focused, almost pixelated. The palate is medium-bodied with fine-grained tannins, but there is real backbone and structure to this wine. Deep, intense, classy, and classic in style, delivering an immense amount of sapidity on the enormously persistent finish. "The 2019 Haut-Bailly was picked 23 September to 10 October. After 10-15 minutes in the glass the wine gradually unfurls to reveal beautiful red berry fruit, crushed stone, wilted rose petals and faint hints of blueberry. The palate is quite brilliantly balanced, the tannins extremely fine and framing the slightly earthy black fruit laced with salt. Though Véronique Sanders suggests that it bears a semblance to the 2009 with more depth, I cannot see that verisimilitude. To me, it is a less flamboyant and more terroir expressive Haut-Bailly that has an effortless allure and a sense of sophistication. Wonderful. 2024 - 2055."

"The 2019 Haut-Bailly is a huge, powerful wine. There is plenty of the richness of this warm vintage, but a ton of tannin too. In most warmer years, Haut-Bailly can be a real charmer upfront, but in 2019 it's all about somber dark fruit, tannin, and structure. A wine of breadth and power, Haut-Bailly will need many years in the cellar to truly blossom. It's unquestionably a big wine with a brilliant future. "Dark ruby garnet, violet reflections, subtle ocher edge brightening. Dark forest berry confit with a delicate floral underlay, nuances of blackberries and liquorice, fine notes of tobacco, a hint of orange zest, mineral touch. "The nose is elegant, fine and offers a beautiful power, delicacy, and complexity. It reveals notes of crushed cassis, crushed wild blackberry, small notes of violet, wild strawberry associated with small touches of small blue fruits, violet crushed plum, caramelization as well as very fine hints of camphor, tonka bean and grey pepper. The palate is fruity, well-balanced and offers an acidulous, complexity, tension as well as a finesse of the grain. On the palate this wine expresses notes of pulpy/juicy wild cassis, raspberry, small notes of small juicy violet plum associated with touches of toasted, small fleshy/crushed fruits, chocolate, caramelization as well as fine hints of racy minerality, sweet spices and nutmeg. Tannins are elegant, racy and well-built."
