General Info Chateau Canon is a highly esteemed wine production estate in the Saint Emilion

appellation of Bordeaux, France. Originally referred to as Clos St-Martin, this top

Bordeaux fine wine is ranked among the Premier Grand Crus Classe B, as designated by

the classification of Saint Emilion wine.

Chateau Canon, located in the southwest of Saint Emilion, is a neighbor to other renowned wine estates like Chateau Magdelaine, Chateau La Gaffeliere and Chateau Ausone. The vineyard surface measures around 21.5 hectares, with a grape selection of

60% Merlot and 40% Cabernet Franc.

Since the early 20th century, Chateau Canon has been rated as one of the best Saint Emilion wines; in total, around 7,500 – 9,000 cases are produced each year, of both the

first wine Chateau Canon as well as the second wine Clos de Canon.

Vineyards Chateau Canon owns 34 hectares of vines. 24 of those hectares are used to produce

Chateau Canon. The vineyard of Chateau Canon is located in the heart of the St. Emilion, on the top of the limestone plateau. The terroir is clay and limestone soils. Their best parcels are close to the chateau, near the cemetery and in front of the chateau, with views of the St. Emilion village. This shows a marked increase in the amount of Cabernet Franc in the vines. There has been a slow, on-going program to add more Cabernet Franc to the vineyard, which took over 15 years. And it is still ongoing! The vineyard is planted to a vine density that ranges from 5,500 to 6,500 vines per

hectare. The newer plantings are all at the higher levels of density

Harvest Merlot: 4 to 21 September; Cabernet Franc: 18 September to 23 September

A yield of 40hl/ha.

Vinification/ Separate vinification, vatting using gravity, into conical shaped stainless-steel vats with a double walled system

Maturation for temperature control. Malolactic: 1/3 in new barrels and 2/3 in stainless steel vats. The wine is aged for 18

months in 50% new, French oak barrels.

Tasting Notes This wine opens up with earthy, slightly peaty notes before giving way to aromas of cedar. A few swirls in the

glass release an explosion of fruity aromas and reveal a fluid, ethereal and almost weightless nose, a sign of its remarkable complexity. The splendour of the vintage truly comes into its own on the palate with its rich attack and juicy, creamy overtones yet without the slightest hint of heaviness. Quite the contrary, this richness actually elongates the palate with notes of ripe fruit, raspberries and morello cherries. It also has this long, precise salinity to it which structures the finish. A lively, mineral touch from the limestone plateau adds the

finishing touches and brings the wine's freshness back to the forefront

Serve with Chateau Canon is best paired with all types of classic meat dishes, veal, pork, beef, lamb, duck, game, roast

chicken, roasted, braised, and grilled dishes.

"Suavely rendered, this glides along with a cashmere feel, letting gently steeped black currant and black cherry fruit unfurl slowly, while hints of alder, sweet tobacco and warm earth appear in the background. "The brilliant 2020 Canon looks set to surpass both the 2019 and 2016 as this estate's finest wine since the postwar period, though like many of the best 2020s, it will require more patience than its 2019 counterpart. Unwinding in the glass with aromas of cherries and raspberries mingled with notions of exotic spices and iris, it's medium to full-bodied, deep, and concentrated, with vibrant acids and beautifully polished, chalky tannins. Pure and precise, it concludes with a long, mouthwatering finish. This beautifully constructed wine communicates the essence of this superb limestone terroir, and it will be worth a special effort to track down and cellar. In the last few years, this sleeping giant has well and truly reawakened, and the 2020 vintage represents the finest Canon produced since the early 1960s. Extensive replanting between 1996 and 2003, overseen by Audebert's predecessor, John Kolasa, saw some 50% of the estate's 22 hectares replaced. The fact that these vines are now arriving at full maturity surely goes some way to accounting for Canon's contemporary renaissance. Now, the team is working on restructuring the rest, combining massal selections and clones. Viticulture is thoughtful, with cover crops across the estate, and the terroir itself is relatively homogeneous: solid limestone covered by some 0.25 to 0.7 meters of clay, with a more or less uniform exposition on Saint-Émilion's plateau. There's also one small parcel in the town itself and another by Berliquet. Today, the vineyard is planted with about 70% Merlot and 30% Cabernet Franc, and there are no plans to radically alter that. Winemaking privileges finesse over power, though a certain richness and texture can be taken for granted with a site like this, and maturation is in 50% new oak (mostly from Taransaud, Demptos, Sylvain and Quintessence). Today, the focus is on increasing precision and refinement, rather than revolution. And well it might be, for why change a winning team?" - WK, Wine Advocate

"Deep garnet-purple colored, it bursts from the glass with vivacious notes of Morello cherries, redcurrant jelly, wild blueberries, and black raspberries, plus hints of powdered cinnamon, clove oil, star anise and dusty red soil. The medium to full-bodied palate is an exercise in grace, delivering exquisitely ripe, finely pixilated tannins and bold freshness to support the tight-knit black, red, and blue fruit layers, finishing long with loads of exotic spices and mineral sparks. An exhilarating triumph!

"To be honest, we didn't manage anything. That terroir at Canon is insane," said Technical Director Nicolas Audebert. "It is incredible how it is always the terroir that brings back that freshness. We harvested a little earlier this year. And during the heat, we tried to protect the berries, with techniques I was using in South America to protect the bunches. But in the end, it is the typicity of that limestone that comes through. It is the backbone of the wine. This terroir also comes in earlier—the grapes just motor through. If we had waited 10 more days, it would be completely different. The wine has no excess—this is very important for us. We are not being extreme one way or the other. We look for ripeness and freshness. With the limestone, the vine never stops. The roots take the freshness and can handle these extremes. It is worth remembering that Canon has a southwest exposure, giving that little bit of extra ripeness. Also, I need to mention our work effort. We worked right through August. You know, usually everyone in France takes their holidays in August. Now, our team takes their holidays in July. We cannot wait around in August. Picking date completely makes what you are.

"On the nose it is well built, in finesse and offers a certain delicacy, a racy power (in finesse), depth as well as a nice finesse of the texture, a multi-layer side, a certain subtlety, and a fine flurry side. It reveals the notes of blackcurrant, wild blackberry, small note of small fruits associated with hints of raspberry, pulpy redcurrant, a fine touch of bright violet plum as well as hints of violet, cherry flower, exotic spices, fine hints of pepper, lilac and a subtle hint of clover. On the palate, it is fruity elegant, delicate, nicely built, all in finesse and offers a subtlety, a nice acidulous frame, racy texture (limestone), a certain richness controlled, a sense of detail, a small pulpy of the fruit and a nice texture of limestone. The wine expresses notes of juicy/pulpy, juicy raspberry, small notes of blackcurrant associated with touches of small red fruits as well as hints of crunchy berries, fresh lily, iris, a subtle hint of tonka bean, a very discreet hint of toasted, mocha and a subtle hint of coffee. Good length. The tannins are precise, elegant, and well built."
