A dense purple color is followed by layers of fruit and glycerin, sweet black currant and black raspberry notes, and a deep, layered, impressively pure, concentrated personality. It receives such state-of-the-art treatments as malolactic fermentation in barrel, micro-oxygenation of the lees, and only the highest quality Taransaud and Darnajou barrels. Not surprisingly, it is bottled without filtration. Sadly, there are less than 500 cases. Anticipated maturity: 2003-2016."

"A new discovery, this 70% Merlot and 30% Cabernet Franc garage wine, made from a 5-acre parcel of 60-year old vines, has been aged in 100% new oak, and subjected to such creative qualitative treatments as extensive crop thinning, micro-bullage, pigeage, and aging on its lees. The result is an impressive, medium to full-bodied, layered, concentrated, unevolved, grapy wine. There is admirable depth, sweetness, glycerin, and concentration to this opaque purple-colored effort. I would not be surprised to see it burst forth over the next 6-12 months. "Deep, dark crimson with a little development at the rim. Not much nose, but great intensity. Rather furry edges on the palate – not pure – though certainly with lots of meat and substance. Sweet start and the oak not too dominant. Acidity a little obvious on the palate and the finish is a bit sudden. Interesting if a little brutal but not fine."
