General Info

Chateau Larcis Ducasse had its birth during the days of the ancient Romans. The modern era for Larcis Ducasse begins in 1893, when Henri Raba bought the St. Emilion vineyard. After Henri Raba passed away in 1925, his wife and son Andre Raba continued managing Larcis Ducasse. Andre died during World War 2. His niece, Helene Gratiot Alphandery, inherited the property in 1941. She managed Larcis Ducasse until 1990. Her son, Jacques-Olivier Gratiot took control of the property

after she passed away and he remains in charge today.

Larcis Ducasse remains the property of the Gratiot Alphandery family. Prior to 2003, it had been years since the wines of Larcis Ducasse were prized by Bordeaux wine lovers. The wine had fallen out of favor. That changed in 2002 when they hired the team of well-known St. Emilion consultants, Nicolas Thienpont and Stephane Derenoncourt to turn things around and manage the estate. One of the first improvements to the property suggested by Nicolas Thienpont and Stephane Derenoncourt was to create a new drainage system. The next step was to change harvesting practices. Now, the harvest takes place when the fruit is ripe, and the

picking can take as long as 2 to 3 weeks to complete.

Vintage The 2017 vintage will have gone through several stages to give birth to great red

wines. Despite a difficult start to the year the season unfolded in a remarkable way with dry weather until summer. The beautiful month of August will allow a very good development of the vine, and despite some rain in September, the good maturation

of the grapes will be ensured, they will be rich and concentrated at harvest time.

Terroirs: 10% of limestone-clay plateau on asteriated limestone, 55% of south facing terraces - very shallow

Vineyard management: ongoing search for balances thanks to traditional light ploughing, spontaneous natural growth or inter-row planting. Continual programme of renovation of the vines: grubbing up, complantation and replanting. Numerous manual interventions: de-budding, leaf-thinning and green harvest. 100% hand-

picked harvest.

Merlots from September 18th to 29th, and the Cabernets francs from September 29th to October 2nd. Harvest

Winemaking To produce the wine of Chateau Larcis Ducasse, the grapes are whole berry fermented. The fruit is transported

> by gravity flow into traditional cement tanks for fermentation. Cuvasion takes between 25-28 days. There are no pump overs. Pigeages are conducted during fermentation. Malolactic fermentation takes place in the barrel. The wine of Chateau Larcis Ducasse is aged in 70% new, 30% 1-year old, French oak barrels for an average of

16-18 months.

Tasting Notes The nose discovers a beautiful solar and concentrated bouquet of blackberry, black cherry liqueur and sweet

> spice aromas along with delicate floral notes that evoke rose petal and violet scents. With roundness and fleshiness, Chateau Larcis Ducasse 2017 reveals a velvety, sensual, and fleshy mouthfeel, which envelops the palate in a succession of different sensations. Fine tannins that coat the palate give structure while the midpalate centers on fruit concentration. This all unfolds with freshness and vivacity to give a persistent and

aromatic finish.

Serve with Château Larcis Ducasse 2017 would be a wonderful accompaniment to roast beef with a Périgord cep sauce

accompanied by baked apples, veal chop à la Dijonnaise, roast duck, or a confit lamb mouse.

For a pairing with cheeses, choose soft cheeses with a bloomy rind: Brie, Brillat-savarin, Camembert, Chaource

or Coulommiers.

Cellaring

Drink 2023-2030. Château Larcis Ducasse 2017 will reach its qualitative peak between 2027 and 2032, possessing indeed a very good aptitude for cellar aging. However, it lends itself very well to tasting today. To do this, take to open the bottle at room temperature and decant it 3 to 4 hours before tasting. The bottles will be kept in the cellar protected from the light, lying down, at an optimal hygrometric degree of 70%.

"The 2017 Larcis Ducasse was picked from 18 September until 2 October. It has a very well-defined bouquet with tightly wound black cherries, raspberry, and bilberry fruit, touches of iodine developing in the glass, comparatively intense for a 2017 vintage. The palate is medium-bodied with supple tannins, fine acidity, but just missing that "spark" that would elevate it higher. It has fine density and a gentle grip with touches of brown spice and mint towards the finish. It closes in a rather "serious" fashion with moderate length. Tasted at the Larcis Ducasse vertical in Bordeaux."

"The 2017 Larcis-Ducasse was cropped at 34hl/ha from 18 to 29 September for the Merlot and 29 September to 2 October for the Cabernet Franc. It has a very high-toned, iodine-tinged bouquet that just lacks the usual harmony, and certainly the cohesion that I discerned apropos the 2015 and 2016 vintages at this early stage. The palate is underpinned by fine tannin and here demonstrates much more harmony than the aromatics. The black fruit is flecked with black pepper and subtle fennel notes, the tannins are quite fine, and the finish is much more linear and stricter than recent vintages. It is a more classically styled Larcis-Ducasse this year, but it should age well. I expect it will land towards the upper end of my banded score."

"The 2017 Larcis Ducasse is just as compelling from bottle as it was from barrel. Pliant and deep, with terrific fruit purity, Larcis possesses striking fruit purity and tons of resonance. "The 2017 Larcis Ducasse is a rich, sensual wine, with softer contours and more plushness than is typically the case, part of which is attributable to the vintage and part of which is the result of gentler winemaking. Dark red cherry and plum fruit is nicely pushed forward in this succulent, racy Saint-Émilion. Mocha, licorice, and menthol wrap around the juicy, pliant finish. The 2017 is an especially succulent, racy Larcis. It has been consistently brilliant on the four occasions I have tasted it so far."

"I always love this wine and the 2017 Chateau Larcis Ducasse is no exception. Offering up a complex bouquet of spiced red and black fruits, white truffle, smoked game, and hints of underbrush, it hits the palate with medium to full-bodied richness, nicely integrated acidity, and present yet ripe, polished tannins as well as subtle background oak. It's not a blockbuster like the 2015 and 2016 but has a terrific sense of minerality, flawless balance, and a great finish. Give bottles 4-5 years of bottle age and enjoy over the following 15-20 years or so. The blend is 92% Merlot and 8% Cabernet Franc and was brought up in 60% new barrels."

"Blueberries, blackberries, violets, licorice, and ample crushed rock notes all emerge from this medium-bodied, tight, firm 2017 Larcis Ducasse, which comes from a magical terroir not far from Pavie. It doesn't have the density or depth of the 2015 or 2012, yet has beautiful purity of fruit, ripe tannins, and considerable elegance and purity. I suspect it will put on weight with time in barrel and evolve similarly to the 2008. The 2017 is 92% Merlot and 8% Cabernet Franc harvested from the 18th of September to the 2nd of October. 3,000 cases produced."

"The nose is aromatic, elegant, racy and offers a beautiful finesse of the grain and a fine intensity. It reveals notes of blackberry, coffee and small notes of small blue fruits associated with touches of strawberry as well as very fine hints of flowers, toasted almond, and a subtle hint of spices. The palate is fruity, fresh, mineral, elegant and offers tension and an acidulous frame. On the palate this wine expresses notes juicy/fresh blackberry, small juicy/fresh blue fruits and small notes of juicy/fresh raspberry associated with a subtle hint of crunchy cherry, violet as well as very discreet hints of cornflower, tonka bean and spices.
