General Info Classified 2nd growth in 1855. Château Ducru-Beaucaillou is named after the

beautiful, large stones found in its unique wine-growing terroir. The exceptional ecosystem produces fine, elegant, tasty wines, with a long finish - in short, archetypal Saint-Julien wines. Perched on an exceptional site with incomparable views over the Gironde estuary, in the centre of a hundred-year-old park, Ducru Beaucaillou is a majestic Victorian-style castle which has, over time, become one of the great symbols of the Medoc. Unusually for Bordeaux, it is built directly above the barrel cellars, enveloping its owners, who have lived here for over sixty years, in the sumptuous aromas of their wine. Today, the estate is managed by the company Jean Eugène Borie SA, which is owned by Mrs Borie, her daughter Sabine Coiffe and her son Bruno-Eugène, CEO since 2003, the third generation of the Borie family to head the

estate.

Vintage The spring of 2006 was very cool, but the nice weather in May gave an even

blossoming. July was marked by ten very hot days whereas August was rather cool and dry. The first ten days of September were also dry and hot and then there was a rainy period before picking. When it came to harvest-time the dry weather had

however returned and allowed the crop to be picked in good conditions.

Harvest These advantages were all the more marked given the extremely low yields. Thanks to the green harvest in July, we had maximum yields of 4-8 bunches per vine at Ducru Beaucaillou. However, the harvest was not early, the long span of the cycle is another

Beaucaillou. However, the harvest was not early, the long span of the cycle is another asset for this harvest. The Merlot are harvested on September 21st and the Cabernet

Sauvignon on September 29th. Harvesting was completed on October 6th.

Vinification/ The grapes are all harvested manually. They are sorted in the vines on mobile tables

Maturation to avoid contact between unhealthy and healthy grapes during transport to the vat

room. The vinification of each plot is done individually to optimise the choice of blends. Moreover, the fermentations are carried out separately and customized to take account of terroir, grape variety, and vintage characteristics. We generally operate gentle extraction and keep the must at traditional temperatures with

moderate lengths and frequencies of pumping-over. The press drains off continuously

Vinification/ into barrels to facilitate the selection of the press-wine batches.

Maturation Malolactic fermentation is managed in vats for optimal control. The wine is barrelled

in duly identified individual batches immediately after malolactic fermentation. Blending takes place during the first racking operation; for Ducru Beaucaillou, between 50 and 80% of new barrels are used according to the richness of the vintage. The barrels (225L Bordeaux barrels, French oak) are supplied by 5 carefully selected cooperages giving every guarantee. The wine is matured for 18 months in accordance with Medoc traditions for classified growths. Bottling is performed with special care in regard to both oenological controls and homogenisation of the overall batch. The 5

cork makers supplying the estate have signed a detailed and stringent quality charter.

The 2006 of Ducru-Beaucaillou exhibits the same analytical richness as its 2005 or 2003 counterpart. While on a par with those top-quality vintages, it boasts a special

personality: endowed with a generous fruit and a superb freshness, presenting an

elegant albeit solid structure.

"Similar in style to the 1996, proprietor Bruno Borie continues to curtail yields, now producing just under 10,000 cases of the grand vin, and the rest of the production going into the increasingly high quality second wine, La Croix de Ducru Beaucaillou. The backward, tannic, dense purple-colored 2006 Ducru Beaucaillou offers sweet mineral-infused black cherry and cassis fruit interwoven with notions of graphite and truffles. Powerful, pure, rich, and intense, it should be at its peak between 2017-2035."

"The grapes for this wine come from about half of the 75-ha estate - the half closest to the Gironde, where at dawn it can be 5 degrees warmer than Listrac. Deep crimson. Spicy, finely polished nose. Very glossy, only very slightly inky. Glossy, polished ink. Gentle - tastes as though it has been ripened gently. The tannins are very fine, pretty sandpapery. Very delicate though a little dry on the finish. Not much real fruit weight in the middle. Inky finish. Gouleyant, very fine, very classic indeed. In the true sense of classic rather than '= off vintage'. Will surely appeal mainly to classicists. [See 2005] Rather in the mould of Ch Margaux."
