General Info

90% Cabernet Sauvignon, 10% Merlot Saint Julien

Classified 2nd growth in 1855. Château Ducru-Beaucaillou is named after the beautiful, large stones found in its unique wine-growing terroir. The exceptional ecosystem produces fine, elegant, tasty wines, with a long finish - in short, archetypal Saint-Julien wines. Perched on an exceptional site with incomparable views over the Gironde estuary, in the centre of a hundred-year-old park, Ducru Beaucaillou is a majestic Victorian-style castle which has, over time, become one of the great symbols of the Medoc. Unusually for Bordeaux, it is built directly above the barrel cellars, enveloping its owners, who have lived here for over sixty years, in the sumptuous aromas of their wine. Today, the estate is managed by the company Jean Eugène Borie SA, which is owned by Mrs. Borie, her daughter Sabine Coiffe and her son Bruno-Eugène, CEO since 2003, the third generation of the Borie family to head the estate.

Vintage

A rather rigorous winter resulting into a relatively late flowering. Ideal conditions in spring that favoured the development of superb grape bunches.

The rather chilly and rainy months of May and June, which inhibited the flowering (with shatter and millerandage, especially on the merlots). The harvest was smaller and later than in 2009; pink harvests to eliminate green bunches were mandatory in August; the mixed berry size bunches were entirely sacrificed during the picking process...

A very fine summer (especially in August): record sunshine (38 hours more than the average for the last 30 years), without excess of heat, but with a severe drought (the most important in the last 10 years). The strong constraint imposed upon the plant by the water situation at an ideal time in the cycle (the time of the "véraison", when the grape berries start changing colour) resulted in privileged fructification to the detriment of growth: these were the perfect conditions for the production of super grapes. The severe drought was also responsible for very small, very rich, very concentrated berries, weighing well below the average and sometimes even beating the historical record of 2005

After a few life saving rains towards mid-September (25% only of the average for the past 20 years), the late season was very favourable (60 hours of sunshine more than the average - 180 hours - for the past 20 years). It helped bring about a perfect maturity and allowed harvesting in a pleasant mood: the record level of anthocyanins and sugar were promising, and the good acidity guaranteed freshness in the wines.

Harvest

The harvest started with the picking of the Merlots on the 29th of September and ended on the 14th of October with that of the last Cabernet Sauvignons. After all the mixed berry-sized clusters (especially the Merlots due to poor flowering) were eliminated in the vineyard, only perfect fruit as brought into the cellars. The berries, ideally matured and perfectly wholesome, were famously small, sweet to the extreme, and tasty at will. The skins were firm and very ripe, and the relatively small pips reached a fair level of maturity.

Maturation

Aged for 18 months in 95% new French oak barrels, other 5% of barrels are one year old. Lower yields (down by about 20%) have led to increased concentration compared to previous vintages. The barrels are all made from oak of French origin that is dried naturally outdoors. Regular topping-ups are carried out during the first six months of ageing. The wines, which are racked every 2 to 3 months,

undergo a total of seven rackings during their élevage. They are fined in barrel by the traditional method. Bottling takes place under sterile conditions using inert gas. Only carefully selected first quality 54 mm-long natural corks are used. Our bottles, engraved Ducru-Beaucaillou, are laser marked and bear a label protected by a hologram.

Tasting Notes

Aromas of black fruit burst from the glass, complemented by notes of wild herbs and a touch of spice. Extremely captivating on the nose, I kept swirling the wine while marveling at the complexity of aromas. On the palate, the wine is lush, complex and incredibly well structured even at this youthful stage. The bright acidity brought on by a cooler but sunny growing season is evident on the palate, keeping the wine lively on the palate even while dark purple fruits dominate. The tannins are amazing, lush and well-integrated, providing the wine with tremendous length and grip. Lingers on the palate. This is a muscular, impressive release from Ducru.

"Not shy at all, with a flamboyant, aromatic profile of roasted apple wood and warm ganache, featuring more than enough stuffing in the form of thickly layered blackberry paste, steeped fig and pastis-soaked plum flavors. "With loads of minerality, a terrific opaque purple color, and slightly more structure and tannin than either Poyferre or St.-Pierre (and that's saying something), this is a blockbuster, fabulous Ducru Beaucaillou that should be at its best a good decade from now and last 40-50 years. The classic wet rock, creme de cassis, subtle oak and gravelly stoniness of the vineyard come through in this spectacular, full-bodied, gorgeously pure and intense effort. Proprietor Bruno Borie thinks this wine is as superb as their 2009. Slightly more structured and less flamboyant than its older sibling, it is a blend of 90% Cabernet Sauvignon and 10% Merlot from the very best parcels of the vineyard. This wine tips the scales at 14% natural alcohol but has a normal pH of 3.6, which is one of the characteristics of this vintage (high alcohol, normal pH), which thus accounts for the freshness and precision found in most 2010s.

"Cropped between 29th September until 14th October, a blend of 90% Cabernet Sauvignon and 10% Merlot, the nose takes some coaxing from the glass. Very pure blackberry, cassis, a touch of mint and cedar, the new oak lending a touch of vanilla, this is very opulent, yet controlled bouquet. "Ducru is on top form these days. Bruno Borie has made some very serious wines at Ducru in recent vintages with many vats previously destined for the grand vin now being used for the second label. From 2003 onwards production of the first wine has been reduced from 15,000-20,000 cs to 9,000-11,000 cs. There is now more second wine - La Croix de Beaucaillou than there is Grand Vin. Bruno's policy is now to only select fruit from the heart of the Ducru vineyard, overlooking the estuary for the Grand Vin. Ducru is clearly back where it belongs at the top of the super-second league. A deep, dark purple colour. A fabulous nose of charcoal, roasted meat, black truffles and Asian spices. Rich and fleshy on the palate with tobacco and cassis notes. Great complexity and good acidic lift. Massive, yet precise and very long.
