**General Info** Château Branaire-Ducru is situated on the opposite side of the road from Château

Beychevelle in the south of the St-Julien appellation. The Château has its origins in the 17th century, when it formed part of the estate of Château Beychevelle. After the latter's owner died in debt, the land was parceled up and sold off, with Jean-Baptiste Braneyre acquiring the Branaire hectares in 1680 (the name has metamorphosed across the centuries). Braneyre's daughter married Pierre de Luc and the estate passed down through the De Luc family and later the related Ducru family for over 140 years. The last family members to own it were three noble nephews who are represented by the crowns on today's Branaire label. In 1919, Branaire-Ducru was sold to the Tapie family, but its modern renaissance had to wait until 1988 and the influences of the Maroteaux family, under whose direction the wine's quality has surged. Patrick Maroteaux has invested heavily in new

plantings as well as installing a spanking new cuvier and an ultra-modern chai.

Vintage Ideal weather conditions allowed the production of a high quality 2010 vintage, in

the same spirit as 2009. The budburst was relatively late because of cooler than average Springtime temperatures. The 2010 temperatures were very close to 2009; the summer was warm, but not scorching. A noticeable drought, that continued into August and September, resulted in berries that were 20% smaller than last year. The yield was consequently limited, slightly below 40 hl on most of the vineyard. From July to September the rainfall reached 54 mm in total. 2010 was

Hours of sunlight in September and October were much higher than average, which helped the ripening of the grapes. At the same time the cool temperature of the autumn season allowed a better definition of the aromas,

keeping the acidity level and lead to a slow but deep maturity of the tannins.

Vineyards Château Branaire-Ducru is tucked away in the south-eastern most part of the St

Julien appellation, close neighbours being Beychevelle, which lies between Branaire-Ducru and the *Gironde*, and Château Saint-Pierre. The vineyards run westeast in several plots close to the *château*, over typical Médoc terroir of Quaternary alluvial gravels. There are 52 hectares in all, planted with 70% Cabernet Sauvignon, 22% Merlot and just 5% Cabernet franc and 3% Petit Verdot, with an average age

approaching 40 years, although there are many vines approaching a century.

Harvest The grapes were selectively picked from September 27<sup>th</sup> until October 14<sup>th</sup> in perfect weather conditions. The blend for this vintage is 70% Cabernet Sauvignon,

23.5% Merlot, 4% Petit Verdot and 2.5% Cabernet Franc.

**Maturation** Aging in oak barrels for 16 to 20 months with 60 to 65% of new oak. Woods

selected in various French forests according to their flavours and tannins quality.

Light toasting respecting the wines fruit and aromatic purity

**Tasting Notes** On the palate the 2010 vintage shows a great aromatic richness and a beautiful

freshness. The ripe fruit is dense and brilliant, with concentrated tannins and a long length. 2010 will definitely compete with the 2009 vintage. For the Chateau, it

should be the leader of the very high quality 2005, 2003 and 2000 vintages.

"Very polished and stylish, with a velvety feel to the layers of crushed plum, currant and blackberry, while bittersweet cocoa and black licorice glide in on the gorgeous, black tea-infused finish. The 2010 Branaire-Ducru displays an inky bluish-purple color and loads of mulberry, raspberry, black currant, graphite and floral notes in its intense aromatics. Medium to full-bodied, with sensational ripeness, purity, texture and length, the tannins are slightly more prominent than I remember from barrel, but they are sweet and ripe (as opposed to astringent and bitter). This beautiful wine needs 4-6 years of cellaring and should keep 25-30 years."

"Tasted at the chateau and the UGC, the Branaire Ducru is a blend of 70% Cabernet Sauvignon, 23.5% Merlot, 4.5% Cabernet Franc and 2% Petit Verdot including 10% of the vin de presse. It has 13.8% alcohol with a pH of 3.53. The nose is very primal compared to other samples with high-toned dark cherries, dark plum and cassis. The palate is medium bodied with fine tensile tannins, very good acidity and precision; not a wine of dimension like Ducru Beaucaillou but I like the subtle touch of spiciness interlacing the finish. "(70% cabernet sauvignon, 23.5% merlot, 4.5% cabernet franc, and 2% petit Verdot; 3.53 pH; 13.8% alcohol) Bright ruby-red. Floral aromas of fresh red cherry, redcurrant, violet, gunflint and minerals. Suave on entry, then pliant and sweet, with a plush texture and a smoky quality to the redcurrant, blackberry and floral flavors. The spicy, aromatic, persistent finish is marked by ripe tannins. This struck me as a less opulent Branaire-Ducru than usual, but I liked its overall balance and light touch."

"Very dark purple. Nice freshness on the nose. Very round and supple and polished. Opulent without being sweet. All assembled by end Feb with about 9% vin de presse. More approachable than most of the 2010s I have tasted so far. Fresh and the fruit almost disguises the marked tannins on the finish. Stricter selection than usual. Dry very dry summer. 41 hl/ha compared to 47 hl/ha in 2009. Small berries. Tasted blind 8 Apr: Very sweet, almost Marmite aromas. Great freshness but no great intensity on the palate. A little angular with some green notes on the finish but a competent wine. Relaxed and comfortable. Not forced. 17 out of 20."

"Branaire Ducru from an assemblage of 70% Cabernet Sauvignon, 23.5% Merlot, 4% Petit Verdot and 2.5% Cabernet Franc, (Similar to the 2009) the wine sports a deep ruby tint. Jammy black raspberry, spice and hints of toasty oak start off the perfume. In the mouth, fresh cassis, mocha, olives and spice combine with strong, ripe tannins, ending in a blackberry filled finish. The wine reached 13.8% alcohol, which is higher than they recorded in 2009. Due to the high level of acidity, there is no sensation of heat. According to the owner, Patrick Maroteaux, one of the keys to the success in 2010 is due to their new method of handling the press wine. This includes ageing the press wine in one-year old barrels and utilizing more selection in the press wine. 40% of the press wine was allocated to the Grand Vin. The remainder was included in the second wine. 93-94 Pts"
