General Info

Château Branaire-Ducru is situated on the opposite side of the road from Château Beychevelle in the south of the St-Julien appellation. The Château has its origins in the 17th century, when it formed part of the estate of Château Beychevelle. After the latter's owner died in debt, the land was parceled up and sold off, with Jean-Baptiste Braneyre acquiring the Branaire hectares in 1680 (the name has metamorphosed across the centuries). Braneyre's daughter married Pierre de Luc and the estate passed down through the De Luc family and later the related Ducru family for over 140 years. The last family members to own it were three noble nephews who are represented by the crowns on today's Branaire label. In 1919, Branaire-Ducru was sold to the Tapie family, but its modern renaissance had to wait until 1988 and the influences of the Maroteaux family, under whose direction the wine's quality has surged. Patrick Maroteaux has invested heavily in new plantings as well as installing a spanking new cuvier and an ultra-modern chai.

Vintage

Due to an unusual warm and dry weather in spring 2011 the growing season started very early. The unprecedented lack of rain reduced the development of the vines and the berries. It favoured a good synthesis of the polyphenolic components and a good richness of the berries. In the summer the rainfall went back to normal. However, the rainfall was far too low to make up for the important lack of water that year leading to a harvest of 37 hectoliters per hectare. The moderate summer temperatures helped to produce a good aromatic freshness of the wine. The autumn was warmer than normal, and the persistent lack of water allowed a ripening of the berries in good conditions.

Vineyards

Château Branaire-Ducru is tucked away in the south-eastern most part of the St Julien appellation, close neighbours being Beychevelle, which lies between Branaire-Ducru and the *Gironde*, and Château Saint-Pierre. The vineyards run westeast in several plots close to the *château*, over typical Médoc terroir of Quaternary alluvial gravels. There are 52 hectares in all, planted with 70% Cabernet Sauvignon, 22% Merlot and just 5% Cabernet franc and 3% Petit Verdot, with an average age approaching 40 years, although there are many vines approaching a century. The harvest was early in 2011. We started harvesting on 14th September and we

finished picking our grapes on 29th September with a nearly ideal weather. The sanitary state of the grapes was satisfying.

Maturation

Aging in oak barrels for 16 to 20 months with 60 to 65% of new oak. Woods selected in various French forests according to their flavours and tannins quality. Light toasting respecting the wine's fruit and aromatic purity

**Tasting Notes** 

As far as aromas and tannins are concerned, 2011 is a rich vintage. The dry weather conditions allowed to produce Cabernet-Sauvignon grapes of great character. They represent 67% of the blend along with 24% Merlot, 5% Petit Verdot and 4% Cabernet Franc.
