General Info

72% Cabernet Sauvignon, 26% Merlot and 2% Petit Verdot Saint-Julien

The vast vineyard of Lagrange spreads over 117 uninterrupted hectares in the Saint-Julien-appellation. In 1855, its passionate and visionary owner, the Count Duchâtel, ex-Home Secretary to King Louis-Philippe, who had introduced a drainage system in the vineyard, contributed to its classification as a third growth. The beginning of the 20th century was much less glorious as the economic conditions deteriorated. Despite several changes in ownership, the decline in business meant the estate had to be broken up: from 280 hectares in 1840, the domain had been reduced to 57 hectares by December 1983, when the Japanese group Suntory bought it from the Cendoya family, owners since 1925. By dint of more than twenty years of major efforts and investments, Château Lagrange is universally acknowledged as being back in excellent form after this restructuration which is considered as the most spectacular of the Medoc. In May 2007, Bruno Eycard succeeded to Marcel Ducasse (1984-2007) as Director of Château Lagrange. In 2008 was realised a new refurbishing of the vinification room. In 2009, Château Lagrange innovated with the optical sortout of the berries in order to face the great volume of berries to sort out in this big estate. The great care taken to the vineyard (yield control, harvest by hand) and the vinification plot by plot give birth each year to a rich and elegant wine, with a long ageing potential.

Vintage

The spring is marked by important rainfall and cooler temperatures than usual. The morning frost of April 7th caused some flower shatter on some plots. The month of July is hot and dry, but never over-hot. Cool temperatures and rainfall come back again in August. The Bordeaux miracle happened again from September 15th onwards. The hot days allowed thus ripening, drying the bunches and avoiding botrytis or sunburn. The nights were cool, finishing off the ripening of the polyphenols. The exceptional sunshine destroyed any molecules potentially responsible for a vegetal taste in the wine. Despite forecasts of low yields, about 25 hectares were thinned out in July. Thanks to all this painstaking work, the vines were all evened out and the grapes could ripen beautifully for the harvest.

The blending: 2008 is a vintage where the Cabernet Sauvignon dominates mostly to the detriment of the Petit Verdot Global warming, thinning out and vine-care techniques are few of the numerous and complex reasons for this. The blending consists of 72% CS, 26% merlot and 2% Petit Verdot.

Vineyards

Located entirely within the appellation of Saint-Julien, our vineyard stretches in a single block over two North-South rises of Gunzian gravelly soil. In parts large and coarse and in others finer, this gravel is combined with sand or iron-rich clay depending on the plots. With an altitude of 24 metres, the centre of the domain marks the highest point of Saint-Julien. The estate covers 157 hectares (390 acres), of which 115 hectares (284 acres) are under vine. Most of the plots benefit from a drainage system. The red grape varieties planted are those that typically thrive on the Médoc terroir, with 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, 28% Merlot and 7% Petit Verdot. The Cabernet Sauvignon contributes structure and ageing potential, the Merlot roundness and body, and the Petit Verdot fruit and complexity.

As for the white wine, our Sauvignon (60%), Sémillon (30%) and Muscadelle (10%) are planted over 4 hectares (10 acres).

Harvest

The harvest dates were probably the latest chateau LaGrange ever experienced: from October 6th to the 22nd. There was a deliberate new choice to wait for the optimum picking date.





Maturation

The investment in new vats allows a separate vinification of certain plots whose potential was not hitherto exploited to the full , through lack of small capacity vats. The estate has continued the technique of co –inoculation allowing to conduct the alcoholic and malolactic fermentations simultaneously. This offers the advantage of economizing considerable amounts of heating energy and reducing the risk of Brettanomyces in the wine. 21 months in French oak - 60% new barrels

Tasting Notes

The nose of 2008 vintage reveals subtle hints of gooseberry and blackcurrant. In the

mouth the fruit is ripe with powerful tannins.

Maturation in barrels allow this great wine to be round. A great Saint Julien at the

height of his reputation!

There is plenty of sweet tannin in this medium-bodied effort, but unlike the tannins in the right bank wines, the tannins in most of the northern Medocs are more prominent, largely because these wines possess high percentages of Cabernet Sauvignon.
