Grape Variety Appellation General Info

73% Cabernet Sauvignon, 27% Merlot and 4% Petit Verdot Saint-Julien

The vast vineyard of Lagrange spreads over 117 uninterrupted hectares in the Saint-Julien-appellation. In 1855, its passionate and visionary owner, the Count Duchâtel, ex-Home Secretary to King Louis-Philippe, who had introduced a drainage system in the vineyard, contributed to its classification as a third growth. The beginning of the 20th century was much less glorious as the economic conditions deteriorated. Despite several changes in ownership, the decline in business meant the estate had to be broken up: from 280 hectares in1840, the domain had been reduced to 57 hectares by December 1983, when the Japanese group Suntory bought it from the Cendoya family, owners since 1925. By dint of more than twenty years of major efforts and investments, Château Lagrange is universally acknowledged as being back in excellent form after this restructuration which is considered as the most spectacular of the Medoc. In May 2007, Bruno Eycard succeeded to Marcel Ducasse (1984-2007) as Director of Château Lagrange. In 2008 was realised a new refurbishing of the vinification room. In 2009, Château Lagrange innovated with the optical sortout of the berries in order to face the great volume of berries to sort out in this big estate. The great care taken to the vineyard (yield control, harvest by hand) and the vinification plot by plot give birth each year to a rich and elegant wine, with a long ageing potential.

Surprisingly, 2009 is not a very hot year (nowhere near the heatwave of 2003), nor is it a very dry one such as 2002 or 2005. However, we can say that the arrival of rainfall and warmth corresponded perfectly to the vine's needs during its growth cycle. Indeed, after a cold and wet winter that replenished the water supply and postponed the bud break, the weather conditions during the blossoming period were excellent. Moreover, the climatic conditions during the months of August, September and October were very favorable. Dry, but never to the point of creating a water shortage and hot, but not to the point of burning the berries and dehydrating them. The three months leading up to the harvest brought us great quality potential. In view of the exceptional weather conditions, we decide to stop the de-leafing to allow the leaves to protect the berries from the sunrays. The "toilettage" (a sort of

elimination of the second-generation bunches) is relatively light as the climatic conditions and the homogeneity of the grapes do not require it.
Vineyards
Located entirely within the appellation of Saint-Julien, our vineyard stretches in a single block over two North-South rises of Gunzian gravelly soil. In parts large and coarse and in others finer, this gravel is combined with sand or iron-rich clay depending on the plots. With an altitude of 24 metres, the centre of the domain marks the highest point of Saint-Julien. The estate covers 157 hectares (390 acres), of which 115 hectares (284 acres) are under vine. Most of the plots benefit from a drainage system. The red grape varieties planted are those that typically thrive on the Médoc terroir, with 65% Cabernet Sauvignon, 28% Merlot and 7% Petit Verdot. The Cabernet Sauvignon contributes structure and ageing potential, the Merlot roundness and body, and the Petit Verdot fruit and complexity. As for the white wine, our Sauvignon (60%), Sémillon (30%) and Muscadelle (10%) are planted over 4 hectares (10 acres).

- **Harvest** Paradoxically, this year, the harvest dates are late. From 28th September to 10th October for the Merlot, from 6th to 16th October for the Cabernet-Sauvignon and on the 3rd October for the Petit-Verdot. Indeed, the recent research and knowledge about polyphenol maturity encouraged us to pick the grapes later and spread the harvest time over nineteen days.
- Maturation 21 months in French oak 60% new barrels

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Tasting Notes As in the last two vintages, Château Lagrange is highly marked by Cabernet Sauvignon. The blend for Château Lagrange is made from 73% Cabernet Sauvignon and 27% Merlot. The blend is very similar to the vintage 2000 (CS: 76%; M: 24%). We no longer need the tannins brought by the Petit-Verdot. These can be less elegant, and consequently reduce the expression of finesse in the wine, a typical quality of a great Saint-Julien. Reviews "A very deep, almost opaque garnet/purple colour. The nose has beautiful definition with scents of ripe blackberries, small black cherries, blueberry, a touch of mint and cedar. Very focused with the oak completely in synch with the fruit. Seamless tannins on the full-bodied palate, lively and animated, very taut, this is not the cashmere wine of Ducru for example, a little firmer in terms of the backbone, very well balanced, perhaps a little more masculine. Tightly coiled towards the espresso/minerally finish, really leaving a tingle of excitement on the tongue. "There is something quite enticing about the fruit aromatics here; there is a bright and open perfume to them that is undoubtedly appealing. And unlike many of the wines tasted here this is unhindered by a liberal application of oak. The palate is fresh and perhaps does not have the weight of many other wines. There is a substance and depth hinted at towards the finish, but otherwise it remains very finely polished but perhaps lacking a little in grit and texture. I think it is the flesh of the vintage more than anything else, and it should come good given time. There is certainly a grippy structure in the finish to suggest this, giving it a long and masculine finish.
