"Smells wonderful, with layers of ripe, rich currant, black cherry, tobacco and spice flavors shaded by toasty vanilla notes that add complexity and dimension. The tannins are tight and biting, but the flavors manage to peek through. Needs until at least 1996. Tasted twice." - JS, Wine Spectator

"This wine continues to show brilliantly and is certainly a more successful effort than the more renowned and expensive 1989. The color is a dark, murky garnet/purple. The wine shows notes of underbrush, fruitcake, cedar, black cherries, and currants. The wine still shows some moderate tannins in the mouth, but the fruit is sweet, the wine is expansive, and the overall impression is a very symmetrical, medium to full-bodied, rather classic Medoc. Anticipated maturity: Now-2020. Last tasted, 12/01."

"This tasting consisted of each of the varietal components of Las Cases, followed by the final blend for Leoville-Las Cases. The weedy 1988 Merlot reveals a light ruby color with some lightening at the edge. Aromas of herbal tea clash with sweet fruit in this medium-bodied, high acid wine. The elegant Cabernet Franc is outstanding. It offers a medium dark ruby color, followed by a super-intense, penetrating fragrance of minerals, blackcurrants, spice, and a subtle mint note, as well as finesse. This was an impressive showing for a varietal component. The tough, backward Cabernet Sauvignon is tannic and closed, revealing muscle and strength. Tasted alone, it is nothing more than a building block for the final wine. The disappointing Petit Verdot possesses a vegetal character, astringent, harsh tannin, hollowness, and a lack of fruit and charm.

Remarkably, the 1988 Leoville-Las Cases has always been one of the most successful wines of the vintage. In this tasting it clearly outshone all its component parts. With a rich, spicy, fruitcake, cedary, cassis-scented nose, this medium-bodied, moderately tannic Las Cases offers attractive sweetness and suppleness on the palate, a well-delineated and focused personality, and a moderately tannic finish. The wine is just beginning to reveal some aromatic development. It will benefit from another 2-5 years of cellaring and will keep for 20+ years." - RP, Wine Advocate

"The 1988 is a star of the vintage. The full-intensity bouquet of pure black-cherries and toasty new oak represents the classic aromatic profile of Las Cases. Beautifully balanced, medium-bodied, concentrated flavors exhibit wonderful ripeness and excellent tannins. The 1988 Leoville-Las-Cases avoids the harsh, dry astringent tannins and vegetal taste of many 1988s. Today, the 1988 looks under-valued. Anticipated maturity: 1995-2020. Last tasted, 5/93."

"Tasted at the Las-Cases off-line at The Square. The 1988s are drinking beautifully at the moment and the Las-Cases is no exception. It has an exuberant nose of blackberry, brambly bushes, woodland, cedar and a touch of crushed stone with very fine precision. The palate is not powerful but very focused with a powdery texture, good acidity and crisp blackberry and raspberry fruit interlaced with cigar box, thyme and cedar. "A noticeably deep garnet core with thin brick rim. The nose is very attractive: dry, leafy with notes of cedar, smoke, green pepper and forest floor. Just a touch of greenness but that merely complements the aromatics. The palate is medium bodied with noticeable acidity, perhaps just a little lean and linear, with notes of sour cherry, redcurrant and cedar. But it a very natural sense of balance, great poise on the finish and would serve as an ideal wine with a simple meat dish. Moderate length. Very fine. Drink now-2015.
