General Info Chateau Leoville Las Cases is a second growth Bordeaux estate located on the

northern end of the Saint-Julien appellation adjacent to the Gironde River. Leoville Las Cases is a perfect example of why the 1855 Bordeaux classification desperately needs to be updated. Although rated a second growth, Leoville Las Cases consistently produces wine of first growth quality. Like its next-door neighbor, Chateau Latour, Leoville Las Cases maintains a reputation for making stellar wine even in difficult vintages. It is the undisputed crown jewel of St. Julien, and unequivocally one of the

best wines in Bordeaux.

Vineyards The vineyards of Léoville-Las-Cases lie in the northernmost tip of the St Julien

appellation, abutting the Gironde, and only separated from those of Château Latour to the north by the *Juillac*, which drains into the *Gironde*. Whereas the other Léoville vineyards, those of Barton and Poyferré, consist of a patchwork of numerous plots, those of Las-Cases are largely concentrated in this single block. This is the *Grand Clos*, a walled vineyard, the stone wall contiguous with that running around Latour, the highlight of which is the stone archway surmounted by the lion of Las-Cases, which can also be found above the doorway to the tasting room at the *château* (above), and which also graces the label. Totaling over 200 acres, Leoville Las Cases is comprised of

85% Cabernet Sauvignon, 14.5% Merlot, and .5% Cabernet Franc.

Harvest Harvested between September 22 and October 5

Maturation The fruit is harvested by hand, usually by a team of workers from Spain, before

transport to the *chai*, where the berries are destemmed before a gentle pressing and then fermented under temperature-controlled conditions. The fermentation vessels include a fascinating mix of wooden, cement and stainless-steel vats. When finished the wine is pumped from the *chai* to the barrel cellar on the other side of the road through an underground pipe. Here it is transferred into oak *barrique*, between 50%

and 100% new for the grand vin, Château Léoville-Las-Cases.

Tasting Notes The massive Leoville Las Cases is not for the faint-of-heart. This deeply extracted,

black wine has splash of ripe raspberries and black fruits. Very tough to judge now because it's so commanding. The layers of fruit filling all corners of the mouth and give you the impression it could last forever. 62% Cabernet Sauvignon, 19% Merlot,

and 19% Cabernet Franc.

Serve with Roast saddle of lamb, fried poultry, Chateaubriand and ripe hard cheese



A blend of 62.4% Cabernet Sauvignon and equal proportions of Merlot and Cabernet Franc (no Petit Verdot was included because of its lack of maturity caused by the late harvest rains), the 1999 is seductive and hedonistic. This successful, forward Las Cases will offer delicious drinking early, yet it has the richness, depth, and overall balance to age for 15-20 years."

"Tasted at the Las-Cases off-line at The Square. A consistent tasting note here. The '99 retains a rather backward nose of cigar box, cedar and undergrowth, here with a faint touch of rose petals. The palate is medium-bodied and well defined though remaining stubborn and backward. Yet there is a lovely silky texture and over time it loosens its tie and develops intriguing honeyed notes towards an increasingly plush finish. The '99 may merit a higher score in a couple of years. "The 1999 is just beginning to show signs of maturity on the rim. The nose is ripe with notes of blackberry, smoke, a touch of dried orange peel and bacon fat. Improves with aeration in the glass. The palate is mediumbodied (for Las-Cases) but very well balanced with good acidity, quite linear in the middle. Fine, slightly "furry" tannins, nice poise though it closes down towards the abrupt finish. Still, a very fine 1999 although outclassed by the 2001. A bit gritty. "July 2002 at the chateau: inky core. Very dense black fruit, violets. Quite feminine nose. Underlying sweetness. Spicy tannic palate. Huge. Quite fleshy, more forward than 1998. Very complex. Real class here. Superb wine. Then at the MW tasting: a subtle sweet black minerally nose, quite light and elegant for Las Cases. Well-defined. The palate is supple and approachable, certainly an earlier drinking Las Cases but there is a nice balance with a good grip. Harmonious. Lacks the usual persistency on the finish but still a very fine wine. Drink in 8 to 12 years. Tasted November 2003. "
